THOMAS WILL ACCEPT.

The Great Leader Will Furnish Music-Commissioners Will Meet.

Chicago, March 29.—Referring to his appointment as musical director of the World's fair, Theodore Thomas said today that he was not prepared to talk about plans yet. The World's fair being intended for a symbol of the world's achievements plans for the musical entertainment must necessarily be novel, grand, and better than anything presented before. Within a few months he will return to Chicago to make this city his permanent home, and will then devote himself to the work.

National commissioners are beginning to arrive for the purpose of attending next week's meeting. L. E. Johnson has been appointed to look after World's fair representation among the colored people of the south. The Evening News says: "It was learned today that President Palmer sent to every commissioner a private letter stating that it would be useless to attempt to assemble again and the letter strongly advised discontinuance of 'hustling' for the fair. These letters caused an incessant flow of correspondence between commissioners with the result that a meeting will be held."

Commissioner McDonald, of California, in an interview, said: "This fair has got to be a national matter, or else we won't have any fair; we shall consider this financial issue from top to bottom, and if we are not accorded proper treatment, well, you will see no fair. This idea of a lobby going to Washington and decrying the commission-ers is a lot of mercenary men, we won't stand."

THE REASON WHY.

Railroad Men Anxious to Avoid a Clash with the Commission.

Chicago, March 29.—The chief subject of gossip in railroad circles just now is the alleged manipulation of traffic by the Gould lines. That the result will be the dissolution of the presidents' agreement is apparently the firm belief of many managers, although the present good behavior of a majority of the western roads is said in some quarters to be due to the operation of that agreement. Freight officials tell a different story. They say the reason they are doubly careful in maintaining rates is because of instructions from their presidents, and that the latter are not influenced so much by the agreement as by the action of the interstate commerce commission in causing federal grand juries to investigate violations of the law for the purpose of punishing offenders. It has been learned that a reduction of eight cents on the sugar rate from the seaboard to Missouri river points is assumed wholly by the Missouri Pacific.

Chairman Midgely, it is now known, made an attempt to open communication with Traffic Manager Leeds, of the Missouri Pacific. Unable to get an answer from that official he sent a dispatch to General Manager Clark, and if that gentleman does not reply by Monday it is understood Midgely will communicate with Jay Gould direct and ask the discharge of the agent who issued the reduced tariff. Western roads are much excited over the matter.

Extended Into West Virginia.

MARTINSBURG, W. Va., March 29.—The worst snow storm in years has just ceased. It lasted forty hours and about six feet of snow has fallen. Trains are delayed on all railroads. The storm extended far into Virginia.

Citizens' Primaries.

MISSOURI, March 29.—[Special.]—The primaries for the citizens' movement were held last night. D. D. Bogart was nominated for alderman of the First ward, James Hill for the Second, H. W. McLaughlin for the Third and P. J. Kline for the Fourth. Hill, McLaughlin and Kline are democrats

and Bogart is a republican. Ten delegates were selected from each ward to the convention to be held Tuesday to nominate a candidate for mayor. It is very probable that both political parties will stand aside and not put any ticket in the field, as the citizens' movement seems to meet with general approval.
