A PLAIN, UNLETTERED MAN.

But He Had Some Good Ideas About the Management of Savages.

Capt. Thomas Byrne, or "Old Tommy," as he was affectionately called by all his associates, had at one time charge of the Huapais, a tribe of Indians settled in northwestern Arizona. Old Tommy, perhaps from his "deliberate" tongue, had an almost miraculous ascendancy over the chiefs and head men of this tribe, and though his native eloquence was seconded only by the scantiest allowances of ration from the substance stores of the camp, he was loved and trusted by these childlike allies. Suddenly one day the Huapais, like a flash of lightning out of a clear sky, went on the warpath and fired on the agency buildings before leaving for their old stronghold in the canyon of the Colorado. No one knew the cause of the sudden treachery, and Tommy Byrne was one of those who realized how much it would cost Uncle Sam in blood and treasure if the outbreak were not stopped at once.

Without waiting for his spirited little horse to be saddled he threw himself across its back and swept out into the hills after the fugitives. When the Huapais saw the cloud of dust coming they blazed into it, but Tommy was untouched, and dashed gallantly up his horse white with foam, to the knot of chiefs who stood awaiting him.

At first the Indians were silent, but they soon melted enough to tell the story of their grievances. The new agent had been robbing them in the most barefaced manner, and in their ignorance they imagined it to be Capt. Byrne's duty to regulate all the affairs in the camp. They did not want to hurt him, and would let him go safely back, but for them there was nothing but the war path. "Come back with me," said Tommy, gently. "I will see that you are righted."

Back they went, following the one-armed man. Straight to the best sonnet proceeded the officer, and in a few minutes he had detected the manner in which false weight had been secured by tampering with the scales. A Texas steer, which would not weigh more than 300 pounds, stood at 700, and of course other articles followed in the same ratio.

Tommy seized upon the agency and took charge; the Huapais were perfectly satisfied, and the agent left that night for California. This was a bitter war averted by the prompt action of a plain, unlettered man, who had no ideas about managing savages beyond that of treating them with kindness and justice.

JOINED IN DEATH.

Strange Freak of Nature in a Missouri Family Grave Yard.

One of the most remarkable freaks of nature was brought to light a few days ago by the changing of an old cemetery near Rosier, Mo., which was caused by the sale of a farm. Near an orchard a small part of the farm had been set aside for the family burying place, and in this several bodies had been placed. The plot was so small that it became necessary to bury them close together, and the trees of the orchard overshadowed the graves. At the foot of Calimensa apple trees were the remains of William Smithson and his wife, who had been buried there about thirty years ago when the tree was small. The two bodies were close together, the old couple having died within forty-eight hours of each other, and were buried in the same grave.

When the farm was sold the children of the original owners thereof made arrangements to have the bodies removed to the cemetery at this town, and they began by taking up the bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Smithson. When the diggers reached the coffin they were surprised to find that they could not raise them from the grave, and an investigation revealed the fact that the tree had sent its roots into the grave and these roots had followed the forms of the dead

couple in such a manner that the bodies had been completely replaced by the wood, which had taken the exact form of the bodies. The strangest part of it was the fact that the root had divided before it got to the head of the two corpses, and had followed closely the outlines, with the exception that a branch had crossed and joined the two in the region of the heart. No vestige of the bones was to be found, and the root was covered again and left undisturbed.—Fort Worth Gazette.
