DEATH IS ON THE MARCH

Several Known Cases of Cholera Found in England, Scotland and Wales.

NEW YORK IS TAKING PRECAUTIONS TO KEEP OUT THE TERRIBLE SCOURGE.

THE WASHINGTON AUTHORITIES WARNED OF IMMIGRANTS BOUND FOR AMERICA—THE PLAGUE ON THE CONTINENT.

LONDON, Aug. 29.—There is no doubt but that Great Britain is having a visitation of the dreadful Asiatic scourge.

THE PERMISSION GIVEN BY THE HEALTH OFFICIALS AT MIDDLESBOROUGH FOR LANDING THE CREW OF THE STEAMER GERONA, FROM HAMBURG, PROMISES TO HAVE MOSTERIOUS RESULTS.

THE VESSEL WAS PLACED IN QUARANTINE AFTER ONE OF THE CREW HAD BEEN ATTACKED BY THE CHOLERA, BUT IN THE MEANTIME A NUMBER OF THE SHIP'S COMPANY HAD DEPARTED FOR THEIR HOMES.

SIX OF THEM WENT TO DUNDEE, WHERE THEY RESIDE, WHILE ANOTHER OF THE CREW WENT TO ABERDEEN. AMONG THOSE WHO WENT TO DUNDEE WAS WALKER, ENGINEER OF THE GERONA.

SHORTLY AFTER HIS ARRIVAL THERE HE WAS TAKEN SICK AND DIED IN A FEW HOURS. THE PHYSICIAN WHO ATTENDED HIM SAYS THERE IS NO DOUBT THAT HE WAS DUE TO CHOLERA.

WHEN IT BECAME KNOWN THAT WALKER WAS DEAD THE GREATEST EXCITEMENT PREVAILLED IN DUNDEE, AND ALSO IN ABERDEEN, WHERE A SEVENTH MEMBER OF THE CREW SHOWED SIGNS OF THE DISEASE.

STEPS WERE AT ONCE TAKEN BY THE HEALTH OFFICERS TO ISOLATE THE REMAINING MEMBERS OF THE CREW IN DUNDEE AND THE ONE IN ABERDEEN UNTIL ALL DANGER OF THEIR SPREADING THE CONTAGION IS PAST.

RESIDENTS OF BOTH PLACES, HOWEVER, BELIEVE THE MEN HAVE BEEN ALLOWED TO GO ABOUT THE TOWNS LONG ENOUGH TO SPREAD DISEASE, IF THEY CARRY IT, AND THERE IS WIDESPREAD ANXIETY PREVAILING IN EVERY QUARTER OF THESE CITIES.

AN EXTRAORDINARY WATCH WILL BE KEPT IN BOTH PLACES FOR THE FIRST APPEARANCE OF CHOLERAIC DISORDERS.

A SAILOR ARRIVED AT SWANSEA TO-DAY FROM CORK. HE WAS FOUND TO BE SUFFERING FROM CHOLERA AND WAS IMMEDIATELY REMOVED TO THE CHOLERA HOSPITAL.

THE APPEARANCE OF THE DISEASE AT SWANSEA HAS AWAKENED THE PORT AUTHORITIES TO THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF THEIR POSITION AND A MEETING WAS SUMMONED TO DECIDE UPON MEASURES FOR THE PREVENTION OF ANY FURTHER INVASION.

IT MUST BE KEPT OUT.

THE NEW YORK AUTHORITIES TAKING ACTIVE MEASURES AGAINST THE PLAGUE.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—A meeting between Health Officer Jenkins and representatives of all the foreign steamship lines was held this afternoon.

HEALTH OFFICER JENKINS READ ORDERS FROM THE BOARD OF HEALTH PROVIDING THAT ALL VESSELS ARRIVING FROM PORTS INFESTED WITH CHOLERA, AND THOSE CARRYING PASSENGERS FROM INFECTED DISTRICTS SHALL BE PUT IN QUARANTINE FOR TWO TO FIVE DAYS BEFORE BEING ALLOWED TO PROCEED TO THEIR DOCK.

BEFORE LEAVING QUARANTINE THE VESSELS WILL RECEIVE A THOROUGH FUMIGATION. THE COMMANDERS OF THE CRAFTS WILL BE OBLIGED TO DO ALL IN THEIR POWER TO ASSIST THE BOARD.

SEVERAL STEAMSHIPS ARRIVED HERE THIS MORNING AND WERE DETAINED AT QUARANTINE FOR CLOSE INSPECTION AND FUMIGATION OF BAGGAGE. THEY ALL HAD STEERAGE PASSENGERS. ALL THE PASSENGERS SUBMITTED TO A SEARCHING INVESTIGATION, AND THE VESSELS, BAGGAGE AND MAILS WERE DISINFECTED. NO EVIDENCE OF CHOLERA WAS FOUND AMONG THE PASSENGERS.

POSTMASTER VAUGHN TO-DAY SENT A COMMUNICATION TO THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT STATING THAT IN VIEW OF THE PREVALENCE OF CHOLERA AT PORTS FROM WHICH MAILS ARE RECEIVED, SUCH MAILS SHOULD BE DISINFECTED.

THE POSTOFFICE AUTHORITIES HAVE NO APPLICANCES ON HAND TO ADVISE OF, AND THE POSTMASTER REQUESTS THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT TO SEND MEN TO MAKE THE NECESSARY DISINFECTION.

COMMISSIONER GILROY, OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, ISSUED AN ELABORATE SERIES OF PUBLIC NOTICES TO HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS UNDER HIS CONTROL, CONCERNING THE PRESENT SITUATION IN CASE OF CHOLERA, AND REQUESTING THEM TO TAKE ALL NECESSARY PRECAUTIONS TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF CHOLERA IN CASE IT PASSES QUARANTINE.

WARNED OF DANGER.

THE CHOLERA BREAKS OUT AMONG IMMIGRANTS BOUND FOR AMERICA.

THE MEN OF THE HOUR.

Sullivan Shows Himself in Brooklyn and Corbett in New York City.

The "Big Fellow" Appeared Very Agile but Somewhat Too Fleeshy.

CONDITION OF THE CALIFORNIAN LISTED AS "PRIME"—A Contemplated Match That Came Near Being a Howl.

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A GREAT CROWD CRUSHED ITS WAY INTO THE CLERMONT AVENUE RINK IN BROOKLYN TONIGHT TO WITNESS THE RECEPTION TENDERED SULLIVAN. POLICE BUZZED UP EVERYWHERE AND THERE WAS THE BEST OF ORDER.

THE ELITE OF THE SPORTING FRATERNITY WAS THERE TO SEE WHAT SULLIVAN LOOKED LIKE. CHARLEY JOHNSON WAS SMILING AND HAPPY, APPARENTLY LOOKING FORWARD TO SUCCESS.

IN THE CENTER OF THE IMMENSE RINK WAS A TWENTY-FOUR-FOOT RING AND AROUND IT THE MULTITUDE RANGED. THERE WERE HALF A DOZEN BOUTS IN WHICH SOME LOCAL FIGHTERS SHOWED THEMSELVES, AND SHORTLY BEFORE 10 O'CLOCK, THE MAN OF THE EVENING APPEARED, AND GRANDMAMMUS REIGNED. JACK ASHTON FOLLOWED THE CHAMPION, AND THE TWO HAD A SPARING BOUT.

SULLIVAN PREPARED VERY FREELY WHEN HE SPARRED THREE ROUNDS WITH ASHTON, BUT SHOWED THE AGILITY OF A CAT AS HE WENT AROUND THE RING. HIS ACTIONS WERE LIKE LIGHTNING. HE WORE A CONFIDENT, HARDENED AIR THAT COULD NOT BE MISTAKEN.

HE WENT AT ASHTON VERY HARD, TAPPING HIM AT SHORT INTERVALS, TWICE WITH HIS LEFT AND ONCE WITH HIS RIGHT. ALTHOUGH HE TOUCHED HIS COMPANION ON THE NECK AND SHOULDER, HE WAS VERY TIRED AT THE END OF EACH ROUND. IT WAS REMARKED THAT SULLIVAN PUFFED A GOOD DEAL AFTER THE FINISH OF THE ROUNDS.

THE WRINKLED FAT OVER HIS HAIR HEAVED IN AND OUT TO NO SMALL DEGREE. STILL HIS ADMIRERS FEEL HE IS IN PRIME CONDITION, HIS FLESH WELL COLORED AND HIS STRIKING FORCE AS MARVELLOUS AS EVER.

A GREAT FLORAL BARY, ON WHICH WAS INSCRIBED "JOHN L. SULLIVAN, CHAMPION OF THE WORLD," WAS HUNDRED TO THE RING, AND AS SULLIVAN BOWED THE CHEERING GREW LOUDER. THERE WERE CRIES OF "SPEECH," AND THE BIG FELLOW SAID: "I THANK YOU FOR THE HEARTY APPLAUSE AND APPRECIATE IT. I BELIEVE I HAVE THE GOOD WILL OF THE PEOPLE HERE ON THE EVENING OF MY LAST APPEARANCE BEFORE MY LAST FIGHT. THAT FIGHT WILL DECIDE WHETHER I AM THE JOHN L. SULLIVAN OF OLD OR THE JOHN L. SULLIVAN WHO HAS PASSED BY. I AM NOT GOING TO WEAR THE DRESSING SUIT OF MR. CORBETT. ALL I WILL SAY IS I AM MOST GLAD TO APPEAR HERE. I HAVE DECEIVED YOU ONCE, BUT LET BYGONES BE BYGONES. I AM GOING TO STOP SPEAKING NOW. YOU WILL NOT HEAR FROM ME ON THE 7TH OF SEPTEMBER." SULLIVAN'S WORDS WERE PUNCTUATED BY WILD YELLING. THEN THERE WERE SHOUTS FOR PHIL CASEY, AND THAT MODEST GENTLEMAN WAS DRAGGED INTO THE RING.

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
