LONDON CABLE LETTER.

Eviction and Care for the Evicted the Present Important Question.

[Copyright, 1892, New York Associated Press.] London, Sept. 30.—The question of affording relief to evicted Irish tenants occupied the attention of the cabinet yesterday and to-day. Morley is understood to have advised a temporary grant of money on the ground that the commission cannot complete its inquiry in time to prepare a bill at the opening of parliament, and while the commission is deliberating evicted tenants will suffer. The Irish Evicted Tenants' association asks the interim grant of £250,000, with due representation on the commission. It is learned that the ministers were inclined to concede a moiety of the evicted tenants' demand, but refuse to sanction any portion of the proposed grant. The gravity of the eviction trouble becomes more intense under the action of Tory landlords. The number of evicted tenants now reaches 4,500. The number of eviction notices pending under the act of 1887 reaches almost 30,000. If the landlords mean to try for a liberal policy by wholesale evictions there will be a bitter land war. The ministerial circle is confident the cabinet will not hesitate to sanction the boldness, measures the Irish executive may require to foil the unionist tactics. The appearance of the Belgian expedition on the upper Nile, within the British sphere of influence, has led the English foreign office to intimate that Belgium must withdraw the expedition. King Leopold, however, is using his personal influence with the British court and the managers of the East African company to induce Lord Rosebery to consent to the absorption of part of the Nile country into the Congo state. Secretary Rush's proclamation declaring the United States free from pestiferous miasmas has not yet officially reached the board of agriculture here. That board of officials, however, accept the declaration as valid and appear ready to respond to the United States authorities' application for the free admission of live cattle. A live stock journal referring to the vast importance of the proclamation, holds that the government must allow sufficient interval to elapse in order to prove beyond doubt that this disease is wholly suppressed, and that this provision should have been made against Texas fever, of which 500 cases were detected in 1891 among animals intended for export.

NEWS OF THE ORIENT.

Widespread Destruction Caused by Recent Typhoons on the Islands. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 30.—The Pacific Mail company's new steamship Peru arrived this evening, twenty-two days from Hong Kong via Yokohama. The gale which swept over southern and central Japan last month, inflicting such terrible damage in the Tokushima prefecture, also devastated the Rinkin islands. The report from Okinawa gives the following figures: Four hundred persons crushed to death and missing, twenty-two persons out to sea, 2,300 houses completely overthrown, 1,500 partially. Crops and trees are also greatly injured. Reports of great destruction of property and loss of life come from several other prefectures.

During a festival at Mom temple, near Kobe, a terrible accident occurred. The temple is approached by a flight of 250 steps, very steep. While a dense crowd was ascending the steps a man at the top slipped and in his fall brought down thirty people. Five were killed outright and others terribly injured. The Spanish consul at Hong Kong has received dispatches from Manila at stating the typhoon reached there and did great damage. People are suffering all over the island.

Reprisals Not Intended. TORONTO, Sept. 30.—A cable from London to the Telegram has the following: "The newspapers here comment freely upon the attitude taken by the Ottawa authorities in the matter of the seizure of Canadian sealers. The Morning Chronicle remarks: 'The Canadian ministers find a great deal to say to the Ottawa journalists regarding the dispatching to the Behring sea of cruisers. It is not for the first time that remind them that in dealing with such a powerful European power as Russia it is not by any means the part of a diplomatist to say all he thinks. The first duty of the British cruiser sent to Behring will be to secure despatch sealers. Reprisals are not intended. If it had been a solitary cruiser would not by any means have been chosen as the sole force to sea by the British government. Lord Rosebery is clearly content to adopt the more reasonable course of awaiting explanations from St. Petersburg.'"

Will Enforce the Reduction. LONDON, Sept. 30.—Seventy-seven percent of the master cotton spinners of England to-day decided to enforce the reduction of five per cent in the wages of employes. The men intend to strike. It is generally admitted in Manchester that the strike will return the bottle and have the trade, as it will enable the spinners to reduce their present heavy stocks.

A Difficulty Broadening. OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 30.—It is rumored that the difficulty between Gov. Shulze, of Manitoba, and the Ottawa government over the former refusing to sign certain orders in council, passed by the government in broadening and likely to result in the lieutenant-governor following the example of Gov. Angers in dismissing the ministry.
