

SCHEME OF CARTER'S.

ys \$15,000 to the Leader of the People's Party in Tennessee.

the Hope and Expectation of Defeating the Democratic Ticket.

Editor of the Knoxville Republican Takes No Stock in the Scheme—Opposes It.

New York, Nov. 1.—One of the annoyances that Chairman Carter of the republican national committee has been suffering from during the last few days has been the posture of his scheme to secure Tennessee giving \$15,000 to the people's party down east, and making this excuse for not giving anything to the regular republican maine.

In reference to this matter United States senator William B. Hato wrote a letter to the democratic national committee. It was received yesterday, and is as follows: "The correspondence between Hill and Carter speaks for itself. Could the proposed combination have been carried out with anything like unanimity the democratic party might have lost the state. Now, however, many of the best elements of the third party are leaving it and renouncing with their old-time friends, the democrats. The exposure of wholesale bribery and corruption disintegrates the opposition."

"Weaver is also very objectionable to our people, which tends to the advantage of our national ticket. Cleveland and Stevenson are the only ones who are not by a very handsome majority, and I believe in spite of 'combinations' we will elect a democratic majority, our state is thoroughly canvassed, and Senator Harris, our congressman, and I have been stamping vigorously."

In his letter to Editor Evans, Republican National Committeeman Hill, of Tennessee, says, in reference to the plan of campaign, that was adopted by Mr. Carter: "I believe that had the national committee been as liberal to Chairman Baker of our state committee, as it has been with John H. McDowell and Buchanan, we could have carried the state for the national ticket with what funds we could have raised among ourselves. But our friends in New York were misled by a class of republicans who profess to believe otherwise, and if they had furnished any money in this state besides the \$15,000 paid McDowell or, as on stated, partly paid and to be paid, I, as a member of the committee, am not surprised of this fact."

"I confess to you that I have had misgivings of McDowell and the items of which you write ever since Chairman Baker first informed of the deal with him, and I have not at any time had faith in it, or ceased to feel that it would wind up with a farce, if not absolute harm. Up here in my country we believe in strict party politics. If a man is a republican, he is a thoroughbred. If a democrat, we know it without asking his neighbors to tell us."

"But all the time I mistrusted McDowell. If he would sell out to us, might he not sell out a little later on? Still, after the bargain was made, and the part of the money given, and when I saw Buchanan's independent announcement, as in part provided for, I had hope that it might pull us through without harm to us, believing, of course, that we would not be cut off with no other help from the national committee than that given to him."

"Answering your question direct, I think it was all a mistake. I believe it will cost us many votes in Tennessee. It is very embarrassing, and I hardly know what to say to you about it more than what I have said in our several conversations and what I have written above. I wish now that I had destroyed the scheme as soon as I learned of it, by protesting against the payment of the money to McDowell."

"Before closing I want to say that the matter is no longer a secret, and wherever I have an opportunity I intend to warn our people to have nothing more to do with it but to stick to the republican party."

"That must please Mr. Carter."
