AN ICE BLOCKADE.

The like has been in New York for many years.

New York, Jan. 12.—It has been many years since the harbor and rivers of this city have been so thoroughly blocked by ice as at present, and instead of improving, the situation is steadily growing worse. So dense and compact is the mountain of ice wedged in The Narrows by ebb tide that no boats dared to force a passage there today. Ferry boats ran on the go-as-you-please plan. Long Island and New Jersey patrons of the various ferries are delayed and harassed in numerous ways and scores of them will undoubtedly be forced to spend the night in the city. Hundreds of tons of freight are blocked on the wharves and lighters. It will be out of the question to relieve the extreme congestion until the advent of milder weather. A blinding snow storm, driven by a high wind, raged during the day and night, aggravated the discomfort and danger by making it impossible for pilots to see far enough ahead to seek out the best channels.

Six boats are fast in the upper harbor. The steamship Heisterman which arrived from New Orleans this morning reports having had a hard time getting up the bay through the ice. A number of tugs, scooners and barges bound south and east are both ice and water bound. The British schooner Cricket, which arrived from St. John's, N. B., Dec. 30, was crushed in the ice in North river today. The captain and crew had only time enough to save a few personal effects before the wind downed the ship. Reports from the quarantine state that the steamship Massachusetts, from London, is dragging her anchor chains and is being forced slowly down the bay by huge cakes which bear her in on to rocks. Two oil tanks and two coal barges, torn from anchorage at Tompkinsville, are also being carried down the lower bay. Division Superintendent Hempstead, of the New York Central, said today his trains are more demoralized than at any time since the blizzard. All western trains are four to six hours late.

Stuck in the ice. New York, Jan. 12.—Several tugs with heavy coal tow are stuck fast in the ice in the upper bay. Pilots are unable to get their boats away from the shore of Staten island. During a blinding snow storm today a number of vessels were driven ashore along the Jersey coast. It is estimated that \$50,000,000 worth of freight, much of it perishable, is lying on the piers, unable to be moved on account of the ice blockade.

Crossing the River on Ice. LOUISVILLE, Ky., Jan. 12.—The river is frozen solid from Jeffersonville bridge to Twelve Mile island and men and boys were walking across all day. Below heavy gorges were formed at Alton, Wolf Creek, Leavenworth, Brandenburg and Salt river. Smaller gorges also formed at intermediate points. The rapid falling of the river in the harbor last night caused boats to be left aground.

Niagara Ice Bridge. OTTAWA, Jan. 12.—Niagara Falls presents a beautiful sight. A complete ice bridge covers what is known as "Big kettle" extending from about 100 feet below suspension bridge, to within fifty feet of the foot of the falls. This is the first time in 100 years this has happened.

Coal Famine Caused by Ice. CINCINNATI, Jan. 12.—The ice gorge in the river is causing serious apprehension of a coal famine. The supply in the shortest the city has known in twenty years. Coal is \$50.00 per ton, while directly across the river at Covington and Newport it is only \$4.

CHARGED WITH POISONING.

Beginning of the Trial of Dempsey, Davidson and Beatty.

Pittsburg, Jan. 12.—The trial of Hugh Dempsey, district masterworkman, Knights of Labor, J. M. Davidson and Robert Beatty, charged with poisoning non-union workmen in the Homestead steel mills, began here today in a crowded court room. Beatty is accused of having arranged with Davidson and other cooks at the mill to administer poison, which, it is alleged, Dempsey furnished. The defense endeavored at the start, unsuccessfully, to secure a postponement. A jury was then impaneled. Their packages containing the result of the analytical tests on stomachs of the men who died were brought in and the attorney for the prosecution made the opening address, in which he told of the confession of Cook Gallagher, which led to the arrest of the accused. He said Davidson and Gallagher would tell their stories on the stand and be corroborated by other witnesses.
