

HIS NAME'S BILLY LEWIS

But Under That of Charley Persell He Knocked Out Kid Gallagher.

The Best Glove Contest That Was Ever Seen in the Northwest.

It Lasted Ten Rounds, and Was Bloody Enough for Anybody Before It Was Ended.

Billy Lewis, who came here and has been known here as Charley Pe sell, started in with very few friends on his side to contest the Montana championship with Kid Gallagher, of Butte, last night.

The fact of the matter is that he depends largely on ducking to avoid punishment, and though it did look several times as though Lewis had adopted London ring tactics, the situations were such that he had to be given the benefit of the doubt.

The first event was a Graco-Roman wrestling match between Jim Burns and Jean Lafont. Charley Eytson was in Burns' corner and Jim Faulkner with Lafont.

The event of the evening was now due. Gallagher was the first to enter the ring. He was attended by Frank Freeman Jim Burns and Jim Stehney.

Gallagher started in the first round as though to force the fighting. He was smiling and confident and the applause of his friends, who were in the vast majority, egged him on until he was sent in a vicious up-kick with his left foot on to his right, landing on the Butte man's head.

The second round was very much like the first. Gallagher made no first with catching Lewis about the hair, and got in a punch through the ropes. Lewis then started to do a little fighting on his own account.

There wasn't much hard hitting in the fourth round, but what there was Lewis did. He started out with a hard left on Gallagher's head.

In the fifth round the fighting began in dead earnest. Lewis began by sending in a right on the kid's head and following it up with his left in the same place.

Lewis began the sixth round by landing hard on Gallagher's nose, and ducking to avoid a return blow.

Lewis went into the eighth round as if to finish his man. He landed his left on Gallagher's nose, and followed with his right on his face.

The ninth round was all Lewis' war. It started with a rush, during which there was a light exchange of body and head blows.

Billy Lewis—as "Persell" wishes to be known by his true name hereafter—has a fighting record longer than most people who have been seen in the ring in these parts.

He is the champion 140-pound boxer of the country. He has won a prize in a welterweight class.


