Arguments From White Sulphur Springs Against the Creation of It.

Taxpayers and Members of the Legislature are Being "Bamboozled."

Would Run Behind Each Year and Would Start Off With \$75,000 Incubated.

To THE INDEPENDENT: Noticing in your issue of Jan. 24, 1893, an article from Townsend signed "W," which in connection with an article in the paper of Jan. 22, is liable to cause a mistaken impression, I would ask for space in your valuable paper to make a few statements in answer.

Now, let us see what the expenses really will be, and the first important item is salaries. They would be as follows: Treasurer, \$2,500; sheriff, \$2,700; assessor, \$1,800; clerk and recorder, \$2,200; clerk of district court, \$1,500; county attorney, \$600; superintendent of schools, \$1,000; under sheriff, \$1,500; jailer at \$3 per day, \$1,000; deputy clerk and recorder, \$1,200; deputy clerk of district court, \$1,200; making a total amount to be paid for salaries of \$16,900. The other expenses, estimating them at low figures, would be: Roads, \$5,000; poor, \$5,000; witness, jurors, etc., \$4,000; district prisoners, \$1,000; expenses of sheriff in criminal cases, summoning jurors, etc., \$2,000; making a grand total of \$33,900, at the lowest estimate that it would cost to run the new county. This does not include bills for printing, record books, wood, office rent, county buildings and numerous other expenses which would increase the amount considerably.


