The board of state prison commissioners hereby invites sealed proposals for the care, keeping, clothing, feeding, maintaining and furnishing medicine and medical attendance of all persons confined in the state prison at Deer Lodge, Montana. Each proposal shall specify the compensation to be paid for each prisoner for a period of two (2) years. The proposals must conform to the provisions of the statutes now in force in relation to the care and keeping of convicts, the rules and regulations for the government of the Montana State Prison and the provisions of this notice. One of the conditions of each bid must be to the effect that the bidder releases all right and claim to the clothing, wearing apparel and bedding of each prisoner at the expiration of the contract. All bidders can obtain from the clerk of the board a list of the clothing and a description of the food required each day for the prisoners. Each proposal must be accompanied by a certified check in the sum of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars and endorsed "Bids for keeping and maintaining prisoners at the state prison, with the name of the bidder endorsed upon the envelope, and delivered to the clerk of the board on or before April 20, 1893.
