

THE DAY IN THE COURTS.

Case Involving Profits From a Mining Sale Tried in Judge Hunt's Court.

Some in the Transaction Claim There Was Not a Fair Division of the Money.

Lindsay vs. Whitaker in Department No. 3—Hanks Pleads Not Guilty in the United States Court.

Judge Hunt's court was engaged yesterday in the trial of the suit of A. J. Steele and others vs. W. D. Flowers, of Bosman. The case has been before the courts since 1890, and involves the question of profits arising from a mining sale.

In defense Flowers alleged that the \$4,000 represented all that Steele, Neill and Swallow were entitled to. He testified that the bond on the property held by himself with these three expired, and he and two other gentlemen bonded it, and that these three made the sale.

The supreme court will be in session today.
