LYNCHEd THE THREE MEN.

Early Sunday Morning Work of a Mob of Twenty at Russell, Kas.

RUSSELL, Kas., Jan. 14.—A mob of about twenty men entered the jail here between one and two o'clock this morning, took out J. G. Burton, Wm. Gay and his son John Gay, and hung the trio to a small railroad bridge a short distance east of the depot.

Orders were given by signs and obeyed without a word being spoken. In the jail were two steel cells, in which the prisoners were confined. Guards were placed about the jail, and it was but the work of a moment for the balance of the mob to gain entrance.

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RELYING ON INJUNCTION.

W. F. SHANLEY DEAD.

An Old-Timer in Montana and a Leading Citizen of Deer Lodge.

DEER LODGE, Jan. 14.—Wm. F. Shanley died suddenly at his home in this city at 7:30 this morning. He was born in Baltimore forty-nine years ago. "Billy" Shanley, as he was called by his friends, was an old-timer, coming to Montana in 1866. He worked in Pattee's drug store in Helena and afterward conducted one in Deer Lodge and one in Butte.

ROUNDED UP THE OUTLAWS.

One of Them Is Dead and the Other Is Mortally Wounded.

EVANSTON, W. Va., Jan. 14.—Information was received here this afternoon of the apprehension of Calvert and Hennel Fleming, two notorious outlaws for whom the state of Virginia offers a reward of \$2,800. They are charged with having committed five different murders and several highway robberies.

New York Bank's Statement.

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—The bank statement is as follows: Reserve, increase, \$5,787,000; loans, decrease, \$622,000; specie, increase, \$7,253,000; legal tenders, increase, \$3,004,000; deposits, increase, \$1,283,000. The bank now holds \$25,183,000 in excess of the legal requirements.
