WHEN THEY WILL QUIT.

Sentiments Expressed at a Meeting of Anarchist Leaders in London.

They'll Stop Manufacturing Bombs When the Government Stops Making Guns.

Capture of a Dynamite Expert—Exciting Colloquy at Henry's Execution—Other Foreign News.

LONDON, Feb. 18.—The widely announced meeting of the Anarchic club, under the auspices of the international workers of the world, was attended by only fifteen persons, fourteen of whom were foreigners.

Other speeches in foreign languages were made, and the audience wildly cheered the sentiments of the leaders. Many defectors in their own clothing were present.

Paris, Feb. 18.—The anarchists here were stationed to-day by the arrest of Paul Bernard, one of the anarchist chiefs, who exercised supreme influence among the various groups.

A bomb which is similar in construction to that used by Vaillant and Henry was found to-day on the staircase of the police station in the Rue du Temple.

HE BLESSED 50,000 PEOPLE. Impending Scene in St. Peter's at Rome, in Which Leo Took Part.

Rome, Feb. 18.—The closing ceremony in connection with Pope Leo XIII's jubilee year took place to-day and consisted of a mass celebrated by him in St. Peter's, followed by the "Te Deum."

A USELESS INSTITUTION. Resolutions of a London Meeting Condemning the House of Lords.

LONDON, Feb. 18.—Four thousand persons assembled in Trafalgar square to-day in answer to an appeal for a manifestation against the house of lords for destroying the houses in the parish council bill.

QUEENSTOWN, Feb. 18.—The American line steamship Paris, which sailed from Southampton on Feb. 10 for New York, is disabled. In a storm last Tuesday

The Governor Gave Up His Place. MONTELOVA, Mex., Feb. 18.—The announcement that Gov. Jose Miguel Gomez, governor of the state of Coahuila, had resigned, created a great stir in political circles throughout the state.

A Royal Wedding Arranged. BERLIN, Feb. 18.—The wedding of the grand duke of Hesse and Princess Victoria of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha has been finally arranged for April 22, at Coburg.

THE END OF BILLY DEUTSCH.

Known to Fame as the Man Who Broke the Bank at Monte Carlo.

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DENVER, Feb. 18.—Billy Deutsch, the man whose name is coupled with the bank of Monte Carlo as the only person who ever made that institution suspend payment, is dead of a combination of whiskey, morphine and tuberculosis.

Reports Indicate They Are in Good Condition. William Courtenay, of Miles City, in a review of the condition of cattle in eastern Montana, says: "In the Yellowstone valley we did not have any really bad weather, or a single storm this winter."

The majority of reports from my correspondents, extending from Missoula to Billings on both sides of the Yellowstone river, during the past week state that live stock generally are in much better fix than at this time last year.

That few sales of cattle have recently taken place, the only cause of consequence I know of being the sale of 4,000 three-year-old steers, "spur" brand, and 1,200 broad and three "square and compass" brand, to the Franklin Live Stock company.

There is some inquiry for irrigated ranches at good prices. One on Tongue river recently sold for \$7,000, and I believe the time is near at hand when the attention of capitalists will be turned to the many thousands of acres of good land contiguous to the Yellowstone and other rivers in Montana, which could be irrigated at trifling cost.

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A HACKMAN ROUSED THEM

The Family of Charles Harris Escaped From a Burning House at Granite.

Out of Warm Beds Into the Snow With the Thermometer Down to Zero.

The Children Rescued With Great Difficulty—Father and Mother Reported in Critical Shape.
