You are hereby required to appear in an action brought against you by the above named plaintiff in the district court of the first judicial district of the state of Montana, in and for the county of Lewis and Clark, and to answer the complaint filed therein, within ten days (exclusive of the day of service) after the service on you of this summons, if served within this county; or, if served out of this county, but not in this district, within twenty days, otherwise within forty days, or judgment by default will be taken against you according to the prayer of said complaint.

and her daughter, Miss Elsie Guilbert. They, with the others, went to visit Sing Sing prison, and, as usual, the warden brought out his outdoor orchestra and glee club. The ladies, as usual, were charmed, but Mrs. Guilbert and her daughter Elsie were particularly moved.

Mrs. Guilbert was entranced with the choir leader—a curly German brigand, who was living in a hazy for a little indiscretion in the thieving or burglary line, it matters not much which. He was sentenced in February, 1891, to a term of six years and six months' imprisonment. His name is E. M. Hernandez, and he has now rejoined society through Mrs. Guilbert's efforts and the amiable sentimentality of Governor Flower.

Mrs. Guilbert at once set herself to work in his behalf, saw the governor personally, represented what a beautiful voice the man had and how much better qualified he was to adorn the Harlem saloons than to live an uncontentious life in a state prison. So the governor consented, Hernandez was pardoned and went out in July, 1893, after serving two
