## AS AN AFFIDAVIT MAKER, Nick Williams Gets Into Trouble Over the Bedford Divorces Proceedings.

### He Swears to Some Things Which Tend to Inculpate Him- self a Bit.

Judge Hunt intimates that the man who would do so ought to be sent to prison for it.

The Bedford family matters took another sensational turn in Judge Hunt's department of the district court yesterday afternoon. It was the time set for hearing the motion of Dora M. Bedford for temporary alimony, suit money and counsel fees pending the determination of Adelbert Bedford's application for divorce from her. Attorney Henry C. Smith was there to argue Mrs. Bedford's side. Attorney R. B. Parcell represented the husband. Mr. Parcell read an affidavit from Bedford, in which he charged his wife with being unduly intimate with Albert Kilbreth and other men in the Austin house, and with Nick Williams; and with being an habitual opium fiend and a frequenter of opium dens and houses of ill repute. He also brings in the matter of her leaving home sometime last October under pretense that she was about to become a mother, and says that during the two weeks preceding that expected event she was making frequent visits to the opium den of Nick Williams, and finally took the child of another woman and passed it off as her own, and when the rightful mother demanded the child, took it and went to Marysville and staid in a house of ill fame. All this, he claimed, was for the purpose of deceiving him and extorting money from him to spend with other men in opium dens and other places. He claimed that in consequence of her actions he had been thrown out of employment and had but \$300 in money. He says she promised not to fight his suit for divorce, but that she is doing so now and trying to extort money from him by her course.

Another affidavit was from Howard Dean. He swore in his affidavit that in June of last year he occupied a room in the Austin house; that Mrs. Bedford rented a room there for five weeks for a man named Albert Kilbreth, and that she occupied that room frequently with Kilbreth; also that she wrote a letter to the manager of the Austin house asking him to have men meet her at that place; and that she admitted having made a living in houses of ill-repute before her marriage.

But the affidavit of Nick Williams was the one that brought on something of a scene. Williams' affidavit was to the effect that he had known Dora Bedford for the past year, and particularly for the three months prior to the divorce proceedings; that he met her almost every day during those three months at an opium den on Water street; and that she would visit that place daily and smoke opium and consort with various men, that he himself during that three months had on several occasions been intimate with her. His affidavit also said that while in a room at that den she told him that her only object in marrying him was to keep him out of the way of the money she possibly could; that she intended to do so; that she did not like or care for Bedford and despised him, and intended to get what money and property she could and leave him; that she admitted that when her husband gave her money to purchase things with she would take it and spend it in houses of ill repute with men, and often with him (Williams) in smoking opium and drinking, and that she had admitted leading the life of a lewd woman and making money thereby.

When Lawyer Parcell was through reading the affidavit, Judge Hunt turned to County Attorney Nolan and advised that officer to immediately lay an information against that man Williams and bring him before the court. A man who would make such admissions as Williams did in his affidavit ought to be in prison. The judge instanced a case that occurred when Judge D. B. Wade was on the bench. A man made a somewhat similar affidavit in some what similar proceedings. Judge Wade had the protesting attorney swear out a complaint, and within an hour the affidavit maker was in prison. Williams was, by his own confession, guilty of two offenses against the law.

### JOTTINGS ABOUT TOWN.

W. L. Steele, A. T. Kohlberg and C. P. Connolly, of Helena, have incorporated the Canadian Northwestern Mining company with \$2,000,000 capital stock, in shares of \$5 each. Operations are to be carried on in British Columbia and the office is to be in Helena.

Attorney Walsh yesterday finished his argument in the Kellough case. Judge Hunt said the court would take time to weigh the evidence, counsel being privileged to submit special issues on findings of fact and conclusions of law, and the decision to be handed down in two weeks or so.

S. L. Dyer, of the Arlington hotel, said yesterday that he had no intimation of the intention to use a portion of the Iron Front building for the care of the insane until he saw the publication in THE INDEPENDENT. He offers only to the sane and to the traveling public not under restraint.

Slippery Pete, alias Dan McDonald, was arrested yesterday on the charge of stealing a pair of opera glasses. He was attempting to sell the glasses to a saloon-keeper, when he was arrested. The owner of the glasses is requested to call at the office of the city marshal and identify the property.

The report of the secretary of the Associated Charities shows that for the week ending March 8 fourteen families containing sixty-six persons, and ninety-three men living in cabins, were assisted. There were 146 meals and twenty beds furnished for sixty work. There were also 328 articles of clothing distributed. The expense was \$177.50.

Dr. Coates' four-volume edition of Lewis and Clarke's travels has been kept in the reference room at the public library since it was received in October in order to give all a chance to examine this work called for work. It has now been placed in the lending department and may be borrowed for home use, one volume at a time.

Duke Detricelle was happy yesterday. Among the visitors in town was Tom White, the pioneer barber of the state. Tom was congratulated by all the old-timers on his very youthful appearance, despite the fact that he is supposed of being nearly as old as Detricelle, who confesses to being as much as 60 years of age. Tom is on his way to Salt.

The board of commissioners of Valley county have agreed to the proposition made by the commissioners of Chouteau county, regarding the survey of the boundary line between the two counties. Each county, according to the agreement, is to furnish a surveyor and two assistants, to determine upon and mark the county line, from the British possessions south to the Missouri river.

According to Dr. W. L. Williams, of the veterinary department of the experiment station at Bozeman, there are many cases of glanders in the Madison valley. The doctor has just returned from a trip to that section and he found the disease in sheep in his experience of fourteen years in the veterinary profession he never saw so many cases of glanders in any section as he found in the Madison.

A short time ago the Woman's Home at Boute received a package from South Boute containing a little girl three or four years old. There were no clothes on the child. She was wrapped in a blanket and arrived on one of the coldest days of the last cold season. The package was opened to show where she had come from. When asked her name she said that all the name she knew was "Nibby." She was taken good care of at the home.

The Northern Pacific and Union Pacific railroads announce a rate of \$44.25 from Helena to Des Moines and return on account of the meeting of the Bismarck league at the latter city March 21. Tickets will be on sale March 17 and 18, will have a transit limit of ten days in each direction with final limit of thirty days from the date of sale. The rate is a unusually low one and should insure a large attendance from this section to the meeting.

The case of T. J. Walsh vs. the trustees of school district No. 1 was on trial in Judge Hunt's court yesterday. A jury was waived and the case was heard by Judge Hunt. Mr. Walsh brought suit, claiming \$1,000 as a fee for his services as assistant counsel in the Grant & Wilson suit. The board contended that there was a contract with Mr. Walsh under which he was to receive \$200 for his services in the case. On his side Mr. Walsh claims that there was no contract, and that the \$1,000 was only a reasonable fee. The evidence was all in yesterday, and the case will be argued this morning. Henry C. Smith represents Mr. Walsh, and Walsh & Newman the school board.
