MONTANA'S FLORAL EMBLEM.

In selecting a floral emblem we must make no mistake. It is like getting married, save there is no divorce—no dying—the state and the emblem are named and selected for all time.

The bitter root has been most favorably mentioned. It is a beautiful, modest flower, yet quite showy when found. But it has one quality which should be fatal to it as a state emblem. It has no stem; it is aculeate, and the leaves and flower grow out of the top of a thick, fleshy, spindle-shaped root.

The only remedy for all these evils coming from the want of a stem is to dig the plant up by the fusiform root. To do this a trowel or spade would be necessary; for the Lewisia grows in a hard, dry, gravelly soil.

With all these drawbacks to the use of the beautiful Lewisia, we still adhere to the more beautiful and showy calochortus, so well described by Mrs. Alderson.

The only difficulty is that, like the Lewisia, it is not abundant. In our extensive travels over the state we have seen it nearly as many localities as the Lewisia. And, besides, it is much more easily cultivated. It is easily gathered and formed into bouquets; and, what is desirable, picking the flowers does not kill the plant, as it does with the bitter root, for it has a perennial bulbous root, like the lily, and is an easily multiplied.

The Lewisia has more leaves than the calochortus, but they are short and cylindrical like the leaves of an onion, and are not very desirable in bouquets. In short, the calochortus is a most beautiful and convenient bouquet flower; but while the Lewisia is a modest beauty, it is not adapted to social uses. Like a Comanche beauty, it needs a great deal of fixing up before it is adapted to the uses of polite society.


