### Tried to Wreck the Train.

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 18.—At eight o'clock the Baltimore & Ohio accommodation train ran over some dynamite near Russell, a loose spot about fifteen miles from Pittsburgh. The fangs of one wheel was blown off and one end of the coach wrecked. As the train had nearly reached the end of its trip there were few passengers aboard and no one was injured. Two men lowered dynamite cartridges were found on the rails. Had the train been running fast it would have exploded all three cartridges and been totally wrecked. It is believed the intention was to wreck the mail and express, the through train from the east due a few minutes later. Arrests are expected to-day.

### Important Pension Decision.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Assistant Secretary Reynolds, of the interior department, has decided that section 41,716 of the revised statutes, relative to payments of accrued pensions, is applicable to pensioners under the act of July 27, 1892, granting pensions to survivors of certain Indian wars. It is also held that the section authorizes the widow of a deceased soldier to prosecute his pending claim under that act and receive the accrued pension to the date of the soldier's death. This reverses the decision of the commissioner of pensions made in May, 1893.
