## WENT TO HEAR JOE OKER.

The Demosithens of Montana Populism Speaks at the Auditorium.

All the Evils That Preval Blamed on the Old Parties.

"The Republicans of the Past, the Democrats of the Present, the Populists of the Future."

Joe Oker, populist candidate for the legislature, addressed an audience on the political issues of the day at the auditorium last night. On the stage were seated several prominent Lewis and Clarke county populists, among whom was Henry Nell, chairman of the populist central committee. Nell, who acted as chairman, introduced Mr. Oker. Mr. Oker is well known in Helena and he was received with warmth by his friends. He is a smooth talker, who can hold the close attention of his hearers. He confined the greater part of his speech to a severe criticism of the democratic and republican parties. His main argument was that the old parties had been tried and found wanting, and that it was therefore time to have a change.

The speaker pictured a dire scene of distress, which he said pervades the country at the present time, and for which the democratic party, he said, was mainly responsible. The want and the poverty that distress the people was an unnatural condition. Bad management and unwise legislation of the old parties had brought about the present depression of the masses. It was not because the people could not produce wealth, for the boundless resources of the country only needed to be developed to bring prosperity to the land. As it was through legislation the people had lost prosperity, it was only by that means that it could be restored. The old parties had tried governing and had made a failure of it. It was only to the populist party that the people could look for relief, he said. "The republican party is the party of the past; the democratic, the party of the present, while the populist party is the party of the future," he said.

"Parties are what their leaders make them," said Mr. Oker. "The grand old leaders of both parties are dead, and their leaders now are nothing but demagogues." Mr. Oker said that the crime of demoralizing silver, committed by the republican party in 1873, and condemned by the democrats, had been committed by the democrats and condemned by the republicans in 1894. They had thus condemned themselves. All financial panics had been brought about by a contracted circulation, and yet both old parties had been guilty of legislating to that end. The old parties had brought poverty to the masses and made millionaires of a few. Legislation had been against the interests of the people. "With Sherman running the administration, the administration running congress, congress running the people, and the people running in debt, why where are we at!" exclaimed Mr. Oker.

In conclusion, Mr. Oker paid the populist state and county ticket a glowing compliment and asked every man of the party to vote the ticket straight. He said that they had placed at the head of their ticket a man as broad as the state is long, R. B. Smith, who would be elected by a big majority. Mr. Oker said very little about Hon. Hal S. Spratt, but he said that Hon. Chas. Hartman, whatever he pretended to be, was not a friend of silver, and that his record in congress had been such that no true friend of the white metal ought to vote for him.

## THE CAPITAL ELECTION.

Some Extracts From the Law Governing That Event.

That there may be no question as to the matter of marking and counting the capital ballots cast on Tuesday next, the following extract from the law of 1891, on that subject, is given:

Each elector shall be entitled to vote for but one town upon the said list, and he shall indicate his preference by placing in a space opposite and to the right of the name of the town for which he intends to vote, a cross, thus: X. In the same manner as upon the official ballot, and he shall prepare his ballot for the place of location of the permanent seat of government, return it, and vote it in the same manner, and at the same time as the general election ballot; and the said ballots shall be counted, returned, reported and canvassed in the same manner as the ballots and votes for state officers at the said general election; and every act or acts now by law made punishable as a crime when committed at the general election with reference to the general election ballots or the general election lists, or any of the details connected therewith, shall equally be deemed a crime, and punished in the manner when committed with reference to the ballots or voting or returns of election herein provided for as to the location of the permanent seat of government, and all provisions of the general election laws not inconsistent with the purposes of this act shall be deemed applicable hereto.


