ADDRESS TO THE VOTERS.

Issued by the Helena Capital Committee to the Citizens of Montana.

"Rebuke Corruption and Rescue Our State From Impending Disgrace."

The Issues of the Campaign Are Whether Monopoly or the People Shall Rule Here.

Citizens of Montana: On next Tuesday, we are by our votes to locate permanently the capital of our beloved state, which is to grow into a commonwealth as great in population, wealth and political importance as it is vast in territory. The convenience, prosperity and liberty of untold thousands are centered in our ballots. These ballots are ours upon the condition that we cast them in the spirit of independence for the good of all, both present and future. Let us reflect seriously upon the magnitude of the interests now in our hands. With neither passion nor prejudice, but with charity for all, let us obey the dictates of reason and conscience. In sincerity of purpose and soberness of mind, let us put a patriotic conviction into our vote, and make it tell, to-day and forever, for the protection of labor and the purity of the franchise.

It is within our power to rebuke corruption and rescue our state from impending disgrace. It is our high privilege to strike down the enemies of political freedom and break the chains in readiness for the Goddess of Liberty. It is our solemn duty to light the fires of patriotism upon the mountain tops and proclaim to all the world that this is a land of freedom. Send out the cheering declaration that no monopoly can rule here. Make it clear that a million dollars cannot buy the vote or control the election of Montana. By the heroic patriotism of your action publish everywhere the fact that this is the Switzerland of America, the home of an exalted spirit of liberty. Then the young will seek our towns and pour their energies into our common life. Then the laborer, oppressed by eastern corporations, will make a home on our free soil, where he may raise his children free from the blight of trusts and the tyranny of the boss.

As American citizens, proud of our blood-bought institution of freedom, let us so vote that our children will be proud of our action. Let us so vote that the stars and stripes will be raised a little higher rather than trailed in the dust. Let us keep the American eagle free from the copper cage cunningly prepared for it. We may well awake to the danger which will befall us, if our legislature becomes the vassal of this gigantic corporation; a tenant upon its ground and a boarder at its table. We shall do well to realize beforehand the disgrace which will cover us throughout the nation if we allow these methods of corruption to succeed and the dictation of a mammoth monopoly to go unrebuked. Let us also remember that the larger the majority against this dark design, the safer will be our common laborers and the larger the prosperity of the region.

With these great facts in mind, let us make next Tuesday the red letter day in our state calendar, which our children will celebrate as the anniversary of the independence of our commonwealth from the hateful despotism of money in politics. The people have made the fight their own, and a careful canvass of the state just completed by the committee, demonstrates the hopelessness of the Anaconda cause in opposition to the voice of the unpurchased and unpurchasable voters of Montana. Our canvass shows that Anaconda will certainly be defeated by a substantial majority, and we confidently appeal to every patriotic citizen of the state to join in an earnest, honest and determined effort to enlarge the majority and to preserve the state for the people by relieving it from threatened corruption rule.

DON CESAR DE BAZAN.

He Will Be Seen in the Person of Salvini on Monday Night.

Alexander Salvini is announced for next Monday night at Ming's opera house in his greatest characterization, "Don Caesar de Bazan." It will be quite a reminiscence to see the romantic drama again, it has become so unfamiliar almost by reason of being kept from the light for so long; but it is a treat to see dashing men with sword on hip ready to cross steel when occasion demands. They were hard drinkers, hard riders, hard fighters and gallant lovers in the days of Don Caesar de Bazan, but they drank, rode and fought in a gentler, more graceful and more love in a knightly fashion. It is the spirit of such a day as this that Alexander Salvini has placed upon the stage once more, and it is a spirit that fires the blood and stirs the heart. Half the men in the audience are, for the nonce, Don Caesars in their minds. Alexander Salvini comes very near to being an ideal representative of the character. He reveals the dash, the swing, the cheerful good nature, the kindly heart and the dauntless spirit and laughs in the very face of death, and what is more, he makes Don Caesar a reality. It is no puppet that is seen, assuming the virtues he does not possess. For Salvini gives the impression of actually possessing these qualities, and words which, on many lips, would sound like the boast of the braggart, become on his the assertion of the superiority which he has the strength to back up. He is handsome, graceful and gallant in appearance. He makes love in an impetuous yet tender fashion that should commend him to the ladies, and is as romantic a hero as feminine heart could desire. His acting is good all the way to the piece, and at times he rises to greatness. When he says, for instance: "If you are Don Caesar de Bazan, then I—I am the king of Spain!" he is superb. His scene in the prison is the perfection of good nature. He goes from grave to gay in the most natural manner, and from beginning to end gives a performance that is characterized by the display of sterling ability and genuine dramatic instinct. The other members of the supporting company are also well to be equally efficient. The local management have concluded arrangements with Director Wilkinson, of the Salvini tour, whereby all the elaborate scenic effects, costuming and armorial properties used during his memorable engagement at the Star theater will be brought here complete.
