

WORLD'S GREATEST ORATOR.

Edmund Burke's Fame Grows With the Lapse of Years.

Edmund Burke, orator, statesman, philosopher, writer, poet, was one of the brightest of the galaxy of genius that illuminated the latter part of the eighteenth century. The contemporaries of Goldsmith, Johnson, Pitt, Fox, Gibbon, Walpole, Wilberforce, and others whose names stand for some of the greatest achievements in English history and letters, his fame has grown with the lapsing years, says the Chicago Post. His works are read to-day almost as eagerly as they were when his work on the French revolution made Europe pause in the midst of war, and trembling or tottering thrones to admit his genius. Kings paid tribute to his learning and eloquence, and jealousy forgot her sneer when his name was mentioned and praised in spite of herself a rival. Not exactly a rival, because in many things Edmund Burke had no competitor. His "Reflections" gave Europe a new thought, and the nations listened to him in astonishment. His essay on "The Influence of Beauty" is as delicate a piece as the dissection of a rose leaf would be. With keenest insight he analyzes the feelings which were supposed to be too subtle, too much an effluence of the soul to be grasped and classified and placed on view. His political pamphlets were the wonder of the time, and were models of statesmanship, although intended mostly to be what would now be campaign documents of a partisan stripe.

Burke's ancestry was not notable. His father was a prosperous lawyer in Dublin. His great-grandfather was mayor of the city of Limerick, and was prominent in the troubled times of the first Charles. There was a tradition that the family came from the noble Normans, De Burgh, who settled in Ireland in the reign of Henry II. Not this theory is not sustained by many things Edmund Burke was an Irishman, but he seemed to have little or no sympathy with the men who at various times during his career attempted to obtain independence for their native land. He was content to be an English statesman, but at any rate he wrote an Irish name at the top of the list of the world's greatest orators and thinkers.

Nothing Done Last Year on the Nicaragua Canal.

Washington, Nov. 12.—The Maritime Nicaragua Canal company, of New York, has made its annual report to the secretary of the interior. The report refers to the depression that has prevailed during the year, which, it says, has prevented it from doing any work or making any progress in the construction of the canal. The affairs of the Nicaragua Canal company are reviewed. The company failed last year. It had the contracts to build portions of the canal, and it was owing to its failure that the Maritime company was unable to do any work. The construction company is now reported to be reorganizing, and the hope is expressed that more favorable financial times will see the construction company ready to proceed with the work and progress made in building the canal.

Oliver Wendell Holmes once wrote an address to a young and ambitious literary aspirant who applied to him for a position of private secretary:

"Dear Sir: I regret that it is not in my power to direct you to any place of employment such as you desire. In a city like this the crowding toward all such employment is very great, and there are a few situations to be divided among a great number of applicants. As for myself, I am not (as I am often supposed to be) an editor, and have no writing to do which I am not content to do myself with a little occasional aid from members of my own family.

"I regret not to be able to give you encouragement as to employment in Boston, but the truth is there is next to nothing of the kind you mention, most of our writers being as poor as rats themselves and no more able to keep an amanuensis than they are able to set up a coach and six.

"I do not even know how to advise you beyond this simple counsel, which I have occasionally given to young aspirants: If you think you have literary talents, write something for the best paper or magazine you can get into, keep to one signature, and you will be found out by the public which is ready to give the highest price for almost every kind of literary ability.

"I do not turn from your petition with cold indifference, but it is utterly out of my power to do more than give you these few words of kindly advice.
