

LEAGUED WITH SIN. Evidence That the Police of Chicago Are Much Like Those of New York City.

HELPING TO PROTECT SCOUNDRELS. An Election Day Murder Has Roused the People and They Call for an Investigation.

Chicago, Nov. 13.—The murder of Gus Colliander, the young Swede who was killed by a gang of toughs while watching the counting of ballots in the ninth precinct of the Twenty-ninth ward last Tuesday, promises to develop into a celebrated case.

The Record, independent, says: "There are indications that men of influence and city office holders were in communication, if not in direct collusion with the gang; that they had promised its members immunity from police interference and that they had paid the livery bills for the carriages that were used both before and after the murder of Colliander."

"It is also evident that the bravado of the gang is not yet broken. Its members who are more or less relying on the promised protection have shown their hands several times by appearing to threaten the lives of men who are supposed to have inside information as to their doings."

"The men captured Thursday, with the exception of Jack Dougherty, whose connection with the case could not be established, are still locked up at the station. So far they have refused to say a word which will show that they were concerned in the gang's raid."

"The men the police most want are John Santry, Major Sampson, 'Uncle' Lynch and Frank Conley. Inspector Schaack is certain that Santry was the man who was shot through the body and that he must be in very bad condition, if he is still living at all, but the police thus far do not seem to have located him."

"Eddie O'Brien, who is asserted to have fired the fatal shot, was arrested. The civic federation has already gone vigorously into the work of prosecuting the gang. It began to collect its evidence yesterday and no effort will be spared to convict those who are guilty. No warrants will be sworn out, however, until the police have done what they can toward finding the men wanted. Inspector Schaack and Police Captain Gibbons. "Nicholas Varalos yesterday swore out a warrant for the arrest of O'Malley, charging him with making threats to kill. Wednesday night O'Malley is alleged to have called at Varalos' home and threatened him."

"He told me that if I prosecuted him for shooting me in the arm he would shoot me in the head," said Varalos. "The warrant was given to Constable Lauer, but has not been served."

"Inspector Schaack stated that he had a warrant for shooting Varalos and that he had sent an officer to serve it. Just the same, O'Malley was not arrested up to 4 o'clock."

"Capt. Gibbons, who was in command of the East Chicago avenue police station under Inspector Schaack, is a cousin of John F. O'Malley, and is hand in glove with the thugs' desperate gang, which is mainly composed of members of the different clubs and other prominent organizations will, upon the convening of the state legislature, secure the appointment of an investigating board and its work is expected to rival for sensational revelations that of the Lexow committee of New York."
