BASE BALL MAGNATES.

Representatives of the National League in Convention.

New York, Nov. 15.—At the annual base ball league meeting to-day the convention decided to rescind the 10 per cent assessment rule. It was decided that each club competing in a championship game shall draw 50 per cent of the net receipts of such game. Following were elected members of the board of directors: J. T. Brush, Cincinnati; J. A. Hart, Chicago; Chris Von der Ahe, St. Louis; C. H. Byrne, Brooklyn; A. N. Soden, Boston, and H. E. Von der Horst, Baltimore. The national board, consisting of A. H. Soden, C. H. Byrne and President Young, were re-elected. The resolution abolishing the 10 per cent assessment also abolishes section 49 of the rules, under which it was provided that 10 per cent of the receipts of each championship game should be forwarded to Washington to pay expenses of the officials and form a sinking fund of \$25,000. The following resolution was passed: "That the committee on rules are instructed to report to the spring meeting amendments as may be necessary to compel an umpire to enforce playing rules, especially those prohibiting unsportsmanlike or rowdy or disorderly conduct on the ball field."

HE WILL INQUIRE.

Why Gresham Offered the Services of Uncle Sam as Mediator.

Washington, Nov. 15.—Representative William Storer of the committee on foreign affairs in the house of representatives, intends presenting to congress, when it reassembles, a resolution or inquiry as to the action of Secretary Gresham in suggesting to China and Japan that this country will act as mediator in the settlement of the present war.

The resolution will ask for information as to what departure, if any, from the traditional policy of the government, as embodied in the Monroe doctrine, is contemplated by the executive branch in becoming a factor in Asiatic entanglements. As a member of the committee on foreign affairs, he says such a foreign policy as is now contemplated should properly have the attention and judgment of congress.

THEY DWELL IN HARMONY.

President Cleveland Puts Some Silly Stories to Rest.

Washington, Nov. 15.—The attention of the president was called to-day to the statement contained in certain newspapers, to the effect that there had been a disagreement between him and Mr. Carlisle in regard to the issue of bonds and other matters, and intimating that it might result in the secretary's retirement from the cabinet. The president emphatically denied the view of the "hatch of silly misstatements," and said: "Never since our association together has there been the slightest unpleasantness or difference concerning the affairs of the treasury department or any other matter. I see it is said that I am formulating a financial scheme. If such scheme is presented it will be the work of the secretary of the treasury and I shall indorse and support it."

TOM YUM, MELICAN.

His Troubles When He Came Back-Surveillance of Collectors.

San Francisco, Nov. 15.—United States District Judge Morrow rendered an important decision to-day, defining the power of collectors of customs as judges of the rights of Chinese seeking admission to this country. The local collector of customs insisted that the law gave him exclusive authority to pass judgment in cases of such Chinese seeking admission. In the case of Tom Yum, a passenger on the steamer Gaelic, who claimed to be a native born citizen of California, and as such claimed the right to land, Collector Wise held an investigation and decided that the Chinaman's claims to citizenship were fraudulent. He therefore refused to allow Tom Yum to land.

Habeas corpus was resorted to by the Chinese. Judge Morrow holds that the jurisdiction of collectors of customs is limited to cases of aliens, and that in cases of American citizens, or persons claiming American citizenship, the courts conclusively pass upon their rights to come into this country. The case of Tom Yum was accordingly referred to the United States commissioner to take evidence and pass upon the Chinaman's claims to citizenship.
