LOOK AFTER THE CAT

The Last Message of Robert Coulter Before He Made His Exit From This World.

HE HAD LIVED THE LIFE OF A RECLUSE.

When Tired of It He Went to Another Cabin and Killed Himself With a Rifle.

Robert Coulter, who had been living the life of a recluse for the past fifteen or sixteen years on the head waters of Sun river, in Lewis and Clarke county, committed suicide the latter part of last week by sending a bullet from his own rifle through his body.

Coulter wrote two notes, one stating that he would be back in a few days and not to worry about him; and the other asking some kind person to take the money in his pocketbook and take care of his cat. These he left in his cabin. Rolling up his bedding, he carried it to another cabin about a quarter of a mile distant. There he made his bed on the floor, and perfected the arrangements for his exit from this world.

THE GREAT WEST.

Subjects Pertaining to It to Be Discussed at St. Louis.

St. Louis, Nov. 18.—Arrangements have been practically completed for the Transmississippi congress, which will meet here on the 24th instant, to discuss all questions which may affect the interest of the people in the territory lying west of the Mississippi river, and which may be the subject of legislation, by United States congress, and to express it through resolution and sentiment of the western people.

While any such question may properly be brought forward for discussion, among those prominent are: The re-remonetization of silver, irrigation of arid and other lands, the disposition of Indian and public lands, Nicaragua canal, additional bankruptcy law, improvement of western rivers and harbors, anti-option legislation, mining laws, and the admission of territories to statehood.

Three evening sessions have already been arranged for and the subjects will be: Monday, "Irrigation," speaker, Hon. Elwood Mead, president of the National Irrigation congress and state engineer of Wyoming; Hon. Wm. E. Smythe, chairman of the executive committee of the National Irrigation congress, and editor of the Irrigation Age; Hon. J. E. Merry, of Lawrence, Kan., and F. H. Newell, of the United States geological survey, Tuesday, "Nicaraguan Canal," Prof. Courtney De Kalb, of the school of mines of the University of Missouri, and Capt. W. W. Merry, of San Francisco; "Reciprocity of Trade," Ex-Gov. Stanford, of Missouri; "Our Relations With Hawaii," Hugh Craig, of San Francisco, Wednesday, "Remonetization of Silver," Ex-Gov. Prince, of New Mexico; Col. George E. Leighton, of St. Louis; Hon. Thomas M. Patterson, of Colorado, and editor of the Rocky Mountain News; and Ex-Gov. George T. Anthony, of Kansas.

A RICH STRIKE.
