

NO FIGHTING AT ALL.

Chinese Gave up at Port Arthur as Easily as They Have in Other Battles.

RESISTED THE JAPANESE FEEBLY.

Military Authorities Surprised at the Capture, as a Siege Was Predicted—Chinese Must Beg.

London, Nov. 24.—A dispatch from Shanghai asserts that thirty-two Japanese torpedo boats made a concerted rush upon the entrance of the harbor of Port Arthur, and at the same time the Japanese land forces attacked the place from the rear, while a heavy artillery fire was poured into the Chinese forts. The Japanese infantry then stormed defense after defense. The Chinese resisted feebly. There were a few hand to hand fights, but finally the Chinese became panic-stricken, and the Japanese carried everything before them.

A dispatch to the Times from Shanghai confirms the Times' dispatch from Chefoo, dated exclusively by the Associated Press last night, saying the Japanese troops are re-embarking at Port Arthur.

Another dispatch from Shanghai says the third Japanese army which left Japan Nov. 20, is supposed to have been sent to attack Wei Hai Wei, where a portion of the Chinese navy remains. The dispatch adds that the place can be easily captured, as the Chinese soldiers who were encamped for its defense at Chi Li are deserting in thousands. The whole place is said to be in a state of utter collapse and confusion.

A dispatch to the Associated Press from Yokohama yesterday says it was rumored that this force was intended to operate in the Yang Tse Kiang district of China.

According to a dispatch from Shanghai, a large Chinese cruiser broke her propeller while trying to haul the warship Chen Yuen off the rocks at Wei Hai Wei, and the cruiser is now said to be lying useless at that place. It is added that China has only four effective warships left.

Washington, Nov. 24.—It cannot be said that the fall of Port Arthur was unexpected at the state department, although officials had supposed it would have withstood a protracted siege, particularly in view of the fact that the Japanese, as known, had no heavy siege guns and were obliged to rely on light artillery. It is the opinion of military experts that Japan's attack on Port Arthur was a most perilous venture on their part. They could not afford to sustain any considerable defeat, for the result would have been, in the first place, to retrograde the Chinese government in its effort to float a new war loan. But by the victory at Port Arthur the success of the latter is assured.

As to the effect of this last campaign of the war, there is but one opinion here, and that is that Japanese restoration of peace is almost certain. With Port Arthur a base, the Japanese now have practical control of the gulf of Pe-chi-li, and their intention is to effectually seal up the water approaches to Tientsin and Peking without being under the necessity of attacking the formidable Taku forts. It would seem to be madness for the Chinese to persist in the war, posing a grudge against Marshal Snoddy. While intoxicated they met him alone, and threatened him. TIGER KEPT HIS HEAD.

The Favorites Had Run Theirs off Before the Stretch-Suspended.

San Francisco, Nov. 24.—The talent called three out of six races to-day, but the bookmakers came out ahead. The big attraction of the day was the Norfolk stables for two-year-olds, in which all the crack youngsters were entered. Heavy betting was the order, and most of the money went upon Rey Alfonso at 9 to 10. The Baldwin stable, Lady Diamond and Rey Del Caredes, who also well played at 5 to 2. Rey Alfonso, Lady Diamond and Rey Del Caredes raced their heads off until the stretch was reached, when Tiger, a 15 to 1 shot, came out and won. Another attraction was a steeplechase for polo ponies, with gentlemen riders. Galloping Dick, ridden by Alex. Sturtevant, of the Seventh cavalry, won. Cadmus was favorite in the last race, but he carried too much weight, and Senator Irbly won under a drive from Lovdal. Tartarian won the short six furlongs in the first race in record time. Floodmore also cut the steeplechase record. Harry McCarthy, youngest son of "White Hat," Dan McCarthy, played in wonderful luck to-day. He started in with \$10, which he ran up to over a thousand before the day closed.

Brien charged that Willis Duff, a colored stableman, had dosed the Baldwin horses, and Duff was let out. Then Rey of Santa Anita came out and won a stake race in easy style. The board of stewards was not satisfied that Duff was to blame, however, and Brien's suspension was the result. The stewards, at a meeting to-night, will hear evidence and take final action in Brien's case. Baldwin professes to have confidence in Brien, and says Duff is to blame for crooked work.

Short \$354,000. New York, Nov. 24.—Bookkeeper Samuel C. Seely, in the National Shoe and Leather bank, disappeared a few days ago. The national bank examiner has just finished an investigation, which disclosed a defalcation of \$354,000. The bank has a capital of \$1,000,000, and a surplus of about \$200,000, leaving an impairment of capital of about \$100,000, which will at once be made good by the stockholders.

The clearing house committee has reported as follows on the Shoe and Leather bank defalcation: "The recent examination of the affairs of the National Shoe and Leather bank by a national bank examiner developed a defalcation of \$354,000, and upon investigation by the clearing house committee, this loss is confirmed. The committee are unanimous in the opinion that, notwithstanding this loss, the bank is in a sound condition and able to pay its depositors."
