IT'S ALDERSON, W. W.

He Would Like to Be Speaker of the Next Montana House of Representatives.

BACKED BY THE HON. NELSON STORY

The Papers in the Stock Counties Are Already Agitating for a Good Bounty Law.

Major W. W. Alderson, editor of the Avant-Courier, of Bozeman, and a representative-elect of Gallatin county in the next legislature, has announced himself as a candidate for speaker of the house. Major Alderson, it is said, expects to have behind him the influence of Hon. Nelson Story, the candidate of the Gallatin valley for the east side senatorialship.

The newspapers in the stock raising sections of Montana are already beginning to agitate the passage by the legislature of a good bounty law. The Stock Growers' Journal, of Miles City, has this to say of the matter: "Let a proper measure be all ready by the time the session opens. Let it be introduced at the earliest possible period and kept before the legislators at every possible opportunity until it is passed by both branches of the legislature. If it is not pushed through the lower house early in the session, it may run the risk of not getting into the upper branch before the session is well on towards its close. Everybody knows the danger any measure runs whose presentation is delayed until the closing hours when the rivalry for consideration of belated measures is keen, selfish and unyielding. No possibility must be allowed of alleging want of time for the consideration and passage of such a measure. An early beginning of effort in this direction will insure a successful termination."

The gray wolves are on the rampage in the northern part of Gallatin county. Already they have killed hundreds of calves and in some instances have been known to attack steers and cows that became separated from the herd. They do far more damage than the sneaking coyote, for the large wolves are much stronger, are more fleet, and when hungry are courageous and take desperate chances. The gray wolf is the fiercest of his species. A few days ago a farmer in the northern part of the county shut two large-sized colts in a corral while he took his team to a field. When he came back after the colts a few hours later he found both had been killed by the wolves. Another stockman, while riding over the hills, came across two large steers that had been carrying on an unequal fight with wolves. The two steers were surrounded by a number of big gray creatures and several coyotes, which had been nearly exhausted with the unequal struggle. At the appearance of the stockman the wolves and coyotes slunk away. When the winter sets in and it becomes a difficult matter for them to get a calf or a sheep the stockmen fear that these wolves will become desperate. They will then go in bands and will undoubtedly attack almost anything that might furnish them a meal.

A SUCCESSFUL HUNTER. Will Hilger Kills Eight Deer and Two Sheep in a Short Time.

Will Hilger, son of Judge Hilger, came in from the Gate of the Mountains yesterday with two fine mountain rams and several deer. Mr. Hilger is one of the most successful hunters in this section of the state. Last week he killed eight deer and two mountain sheep in five days hunting. His brother also shot two deer. People will be surprised to learn that all this game was shot a few miles from Helena. Mr. Hilger did all his hunting last week in the mountains near his home on the Missouri, at the Gate of the Mountains. He is a hardy mountaineer, a skilled hunter and a sure marksman. These facts, of course, account for his success for the game in the mountains north of Helena is no more plentiful than in former years.

The two mountain rams that Mr. Hilger brought to this city are fine specimens. The larger one weighs nearly 200 pounds partially dressed. Its horns measure sixteen inches around each base. Both animals were killed about the same time.

WHAT THE BOOKS SHOW.

A Stockholder on the Earnings of the Rapid Transit Under Low and High Fare. As an argument against the increase in fares upon the street railways of the city, the Telegram says, editorially, this evening, "that the Rapid Transit company's receipts were greater after the reduction to a 5-cent fare than before."

Having heard this statement before and having always doubted it, as being contrary to my own experience, I have had the former bookkeeper of the Rapid Transit company make a statement showing the earnings of the line and the losses in operating during the first six months of 1893 (when operating with a 6 1/2 and a 10-cent fare) and the same period in 1894 when operating with a 5-cent fare.

The statement shows that in 1893, with the higher fare, the earnings of the road were \$233 per month greater and further shows that the loss in operation, in the period when the 6 1/2 cents and 10 cents were obtained, was only \$872.42 per month, as against \$1,230 per month when a straight 5-cent fare was charged.

As these figures were taken from the books of the company, there can be no doubt as to their correctness, and they serve to further prove my assertion that it is impossible to operate a street railway in a small community with a 5-cent fare. STOCKHOLDER. Helena, Nov. 26, 1894.

HE LIKES MONTANA.

The Owner of Robbie P. Will Spend the Winter in Helena.

Edward Pyle, of Lincoln, Neb., the owner of the celebrated Robbie P and many other fast horses, is in the city. Mr. Pyle has been afflicted with bronchial trouble for some time. Should he decide to bring his horses here, Helena can then boast of having the most valuable lot of harness horses in the west. Mr. Pyle said he was told before coming here last summer that the high, dry altitude would have a bad effect on his horses, and would make them "quit" during a race. Robbie P, the fastest of the string, disproved this prophesy.

The Midway market, on Broadway, adjoining the postoffice, has on exhibition two of the finest mountain sheep ever seen in Helena. They were those killed in Picnic canyon, on the Missouri river, by Will Hilger. The largest was nine years old, the other four. Mr. Hilger will dispose of the heads and hides, and the proprietors of the Midway will give their friends and patrons the meat. The Midway is noted for the excellency of everything that it handles, and its prices are the lowest.
