

PLUGS FOR SOLDIERS. American Cavalry Mounts Are not to Be Compared With Those of the European Armies.

Lieut. Col. Kent Suggests that a Remount Depot Be Established at Fort Custer, This State.

Washington, Nov. 30.—The procuring of a better supply of cavalry horses, it is said, will be taken up in Secretary Lamont's annual report as one of the reforms to be accomplished during this administration.

Lieut. Col. J. F. Kent, of the Eleventh infantry, enters very fully into the subject, and his suggestion that a remount depot be established near Fort Custer, Mont., is agreed to by the cavalry officers who have submitted reports as the best substitute for the present system.


Col. Kent criticizes the specifications which the quartermaster-general makes up, and says they will answer very well for a well-bred race horse, but that they are not observed in buying army animals.

Lieut. Letcher Hardeman, of the tenth cavalry, describes a lot of twelve California horses, of which number over one-half were condemned within a year on account of unsoundness, which probably existed when they were purchased for the government.

Another officer says that of the horses received at Fort Custer within the last two years very few have been broken in the ordinary acceptance of the term, and, notwithstanding the constant handling since their purchase, they are not the sort of horses that could be safely ridden, especially at this time of year, when it is necessary for men to encumber themselves with heavy clothing.

It costs \$12 per year to feed the cavalry horse, whether he is governably wild, so that at the army post which Lieut. Hardeman visited the six unused horses were costing \$672, without rendering any service for the expenditure.
