The old question of who is Senator from Louisiana is not yet settled, but Pinchback's prospects are thought to be improved by McMillan's withdrawing.

The name of Hon. A. P. Averill, of Minnesota was sent to the United States Senate by the President, as the successor of Hon. J. Russell Jones for Minister Resident to Belgium.

Ex-Speaker Blaine has introduced in the House of Representatives, the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States: No State shall make any law respecting the establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, and no money raised by taxation in any State for the support of public schools, or derived from any fund thereof, shall ever be under the control of any religious sect, nor shall any money so raised ever be divided between religious sects or denominations.

The health of Speaker Kerr of Congress is said to be already failing under his arduous duties.

Gov. Irwin, of California, in his Inaugural Address, urged that the State endeavor to bring about such a modification of the treaty between the United States and China as will result in the restriction of Chinese immigration. He also recommended that the Legislature demand a general resumption of specie payments at the earliest possible moment.

Secretary Bristow, in his estimates for appropriations for the coming year, recommends \$250,000 for the Chicago custom-house and \$5,000 for the improvement of the Chicago harbor.

Tweed has not been found, and is not likely to be. The latest suggestion is that he escaped on a sailing vessel, held for that purpose off Long Island. Other solutions are as numerous as snowflakes in a snow-storm. It is thought that he got out on the Atlantic in some way, but just how—all are at a loss to know.

Samuel T. Glover having declined to accept the vacancy made by the dismissal of ex-Senator Henderson as Government counsel in the whisky cases, James O. Broadhead has been appointed and has accepted the position. The friends of Senator Henderson are indignant at the dismissal of that gentleman from the services of the Government, and a meeting has been called to give expression to the public disapproval of the President.
