

TELEGRAPHIC.

DENVER, Col., May 27.—U. S. Marshal Smith and Deputy Marshal Erskine of Fayetteville, Arkansas, yesterday arrested the and last member of the Fuller family, charged with robbing the mails at Gunter, Arkansas, while in charge of the postoffice. Elder Fuller was arrested at Pueblo, and Mrs. Fuller in Denver, and young Fuller in Boulder.

LONDON, May 27.—A correspondent of the Times at Alexandria, asserts the resignation of the Ministry is the consequence of an order from the Porte. The chief pasha will form a new ministry.

A dispatch to the Standard from Cairo states that Arabi Bey sent an officer to the Porte with a petition assuring the Sultan of the devotion of the National party and praying for the deposition of the Khedive in favor of Hohen Pasha. The petition is signed by the Ministry just resigned and eight notables.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Representative Blackburn, on behalf of the minority, submitted a resolution proposing that a special committee of five be appointed to investigate the charges of irregularity in handling the testimony in the Mackey-Dibble contested election case. Blackburn asserted his resolution was intended to inaugurate proceedings on the part of the minority to break the existing dead-lock. The resolution submitted by Blackburn was read. Calkins requested an opportunity to submit a counter proposition, stating that as chairman of the Committee on Elections he could not accept the proposition of the minority as it was a reflection upon the report of the committee.

NEW YORK, May 26.—The Tribune says: Jessie VanHeise, of Newark, has been asked by the authorities at Washington to superintend the hanging of Guiteau; \$200 has been offered him for his services. VanHeise has written that if he undertakes the work he will require that a gallows similar to that in use in New Jersey shall be used and that he shall be allowed one assistant. He also asks that the amount of compensation be increased. VanHeise has conducted thirteen hangings in New Jersey. He is an expert hangman and is not credited with a single blunder. The gallows used by him has been improved by him and it is now in the jail at Newark.

MUSKOGON, Mich., May 26.—The strike has ended, the men agreeing to take two dollars a week less price than they were offered last week. A mill starts next week.

CHICAGO, May 26.—An East Town Mich. special says a heavy forest fire is raging, between Greenbush and Black river. Unless rain comes speedily great damage will be done to the pueries.

LOUISVILLE, May 27.—Ten races to-day. The weather is showery and cool, the track good and the attendance large. In the first race for beaten horses three-quarters of a mile, Fellows won, Hickory Jim second, Wapakoueta third. Time 1:16.

CHICAGO, May 27.—A Kansas City special says Gus Miller and Matthew Jones were arrested with exciting a mob of 100 which on April 3d hung Levi Harrington, a colored man.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 25.—The Tombstone Epitaph publishes the details of a fight at Igo ranch, on the line of the Arizona & New Mexico railroad, near the Sonora border. Mescal is smuggled across the line and much ill-feeling is engendered between American railroad laborers and the Mexicans. A few evenings ago a number of Mexicans with their families escaped near Igo ranch. The American laborers being drunk attempted to force the Mexicans to give up their women, this was resisted and an affray followed in which seven Mexicans were killed and several were wounded. A number of Americans are wounded and it is expected three will die.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 17.—A Portland, Oregon, dispatch says: A fire here this evening destroyed all the buildings on one block. The loss will aggregate \$76,000; insurance, \$4,000.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—The Secretary of the Treasury this afternoon issued a call for \$1,500,000 of continued 6's of the series of March 3, '82, which mature August 1st or thereabout. About \$47,000,000 of this issue are outstanding, and after this amount is exhausted calls will be issued for continued 5's.

CAIRO, May 27.—The British and French Consul-Generals called on Arabi Bey and declared that they held him personally responsible for the maintenance of public security.


