

TELEGRAPHIC.

TORONTO, Canada, May 19.—A severe thunder storm passed over this city to-night. The lightning was very vivid. As yet there has been no damage reported.

CHICAGO, May 19.—The midnight associated press advices compute the loss of life in Illinois by the tornado Friday night at from sixty-one to sixty-three.

A Brief Road House, Ill., dispatch states that a number of houses and barns were blown down by the storm on Friday. The loss of life is given at eight or ten.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 19.—The damage caused by the cyclone which visited this section of the State last night was more appalling than at first supposed. Assuming the form of a huge balloon just south of this city, it swept to the northward with terrific velocity, followed by the usual wind and electricity. It struck the ground on Eliza Isle's farm, south of the Junction, and laid in waste three dwellings and as many barns and outhouses. Mr. Isle's house, a large two-story brick, was entirely demolished. A mile and a quarter to the northeast the house of Mrs. English was literally torn to pieces, and everything about the place entirely destroyed. Mrs. English was crushed and horribly mangled by the falling timbers. After demolishing Mrs. English's home, the hurricane seems to have raised and rused on over three or four miles, too high to do much damage. It struck the earth again four miles east of this city, where the little town of Round Prairie is situated, and played havoc with the lives and property of farmers in that vicinity. The first farm in the track of the storm was that of William Contrall. It was occupied by himself, wife and hired man. They saw the fearful engine of destruction approaching, and took refuge in the cellar. Here the weathered the storm in safety, while their house, barn, outbuildings, fences and stock were destroyed. The houses of Wm. Nostrand, Wm. McGeagh, Henry Hughett, Sam'l Ashton, James Trotter, George Ray, Henry Triunty, Henry Forbeck and S. A. Grubb were torn down, and great damage done their other property. The killed and injured are M. Booker and child, Mrs. English and two children, injured seriously; Mr. Tarbeck, killed; Mrs. Jane McFastern, probably fatally injured, Misses Maggie and Annie Van Nostrand, badly hurt. From Round Prairie the storm swept on to Dawson, nine miles southeast, but doing no serious damage until at a point near here. Houses went down and Mrs. Ferris was killed. At Buffalo, another little hamlet, Mrs. Thomas Chandler was killed, and many houses were blown away, but no other lives were lost.
