

Local News

—Mrs. McLaughlin, of Livingston, is among the guests at White Sulphur Springs hotel.

—T. P. McDonald's meat market will deal extensively in eggs, butter, vegetables and produce.

—W. T. Ford, chairman of committee on cemetery, advertises for sealed proposals for construction of fence. See ad. elsewhere.

—Geo. H. Wright, of the Livingston Enterprise, made a very successful business trip to the Springs during the past week.

—The Sage Creek Sheep company offers to sell a flock of ewes and lambs. This company is largely engaged in wool growing and we believe the offer to sell 2,800 head is to avoid overstocking their fine range a few miles north of Utica. The sheep are as good as are to be had—better than some flocks in the country. In 1882 the clip of this company sold in Benton at 26 1/2 cents, the highest figure paid in that market by one-eighth of a cent per pound. In 1883 their wool brought 23 cents, which was a top figure, as only one or two outfits did as well. Read their advertisement.

—On Monday night last the saloon at the forks of the Musselshell, one mile from Martinsdale, was "held up" by a couple of masked men who behaved in the same manner of those who robbed Lancy. They had their coats off and a handkerchief tied over their faces. Fortunately young Warren who runs the place had just taken the money to the house a few minutes before. Three or four men were in the saloon, all of whom were searched, but only fifty cents in wealth was obtained. The saloon drawer was then opened but found to be empty. Taking a lot of cigars the robbers warned those in the house not to come out for ten or fifteen minutes, and then departed.

—The matter of locating a new graveyard, which has been under consideration by some of our citizens for a long time, has at length been determined upon. A plot of ground has been secured on the premises of Mrs. Louise Mayn, surveyed and staked out in proper shape into lots, with walks and roadways between. The same is to be fenced forthwith. Those wishing to contribute to this much needed improvement can do so by purchasing a lot in the same. This step has been necessitated from the fact that the old burying ground is entirely too near town, and is not laid out in any shape, and there is no means of parties who bury there acquiring titles to a family plot or even the ground occupied. The committee in selecting the new cemetery have chosen a beautiful location, and a perfect title can be given to the lots. Any information in regard to the matter may be had by conferring with W. T. Ford, chairman of the committee, who has the matter in charge. It is the desire of those concerned to have the bodies removed from the old cemetery to the new as soon as practicable.

—Facts that have come to light recently establish beyond a doubt that there is now a regularly organized band of horse thieves in Montana. Those who were captured recently by the Madison county citizens and sheriff were probably a portion of the band, but there are a number of others still at large. Very recently Mrs. J. G. Sarter missed a band of horses numbering about 30 head, some of them mares with colts and yearlings. The circumstances connected with the departure of the horses and the movements of some individuals has placed it within her power to trace the matter up carefully. We may be permitted to make further mention of the affair when some developments are more fully made. The band of horses missing were taken toward the Musselshell country and passed down near the upper end of Bull mountains. It is thought they have already crossed the Yellowstone and are perhaps being driven to the Black Hills, or further east into Dakota. The band of horses are branded V on left hip and a — on left shoulder. Some of them had the brands of X H A W and perhaps other letters on them; and they all have the — on left shoulder. Mrs. Sarter is ready to liberally reward the person recovering one or all of the horses.

—The street wrangle between the town of White Sulphur Springs and Higgins' addition promises to be an eye sore to both the town and the addition. The history of the whole matter is briefly told as follows: In 1875 Jonas Higgins surveyed a townsite adjoining the private property of Dr. Parberry, but did not lay it out with any reference to Dr. Parberry's property. In 1880 Dr. Parberry laid out a townsite without any reference to Higgins' site. But the matter did not excite any interest as it did not seem probable that the Springs would very soon grow into a thriving town. Although often urged to place his townsite on record, Mr. Higgins refused to do so. In 1880 Dr. Parberry caused his site to be duly recorded. In June, 1883, the Higgins addition was placed on file. In the fall of '83 the White Sulphur Springs Association caused a new plat of the town to be filed, but it did not differ from the old one, except that it was larger. This filing was made in accordance with the recent law governing townsites. In 1884 Mr. Higgins filed a new plat of his addition, making material changes in the streets, but leaving no possible means of communication between the town and his addition, except over private property, which is liable to be closed at any time; and this is the condition in which the matter stands to-day. The Commissioners, the only body which has authority in the matter, have been appealed to in vain. The town has no outlet towards the east: no public

highway leading from it in that direction, and we have an addition that does not conform in any particular to the original town, in the face of the law which provides that additions shall conform. Such a state of affairs is a disgrace to the county—to every citizen of the town, and especially so to the parties who precipitated the trouble. We have omitted referring to this matter heretofore, in the hope that the County Commissioners would set the matter right; and our object in publishing the facts now is that the many new comers to our growing town may understand fully the reason why a very desirable portion of the town for residences is not connected with the business center by streets.
