

TELEGRAPHIC.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—It is reported that the cholera has broken out near Odessa, Russia. The government is trying to suppress all knowledge of the fact.

PARIS, Sept. 21.—There were four deaths today from cholera in Eastern Pyrenees. No fresh cases are reported in the district.

ROME, Sept. 21.—The progress of the cholera in Italy in the last 24 hours gives the following total: Number of new cases, 252; deaths, 193.

PARIS, Sept. 22.—DeLesseps says: "I propose to visit Panama early in 1885 to investigate that portion of the canal connecting the two oceans."

BERNE, Sept. 22.—A serious railway accident today near Locle was caused by a collision of two passing trains. One lady was killed outright and sixteen others seriously injured.

EUREKA, Nev., Sept. 22.—A fire today came near destroying the whole city. It raged two hours and destroyed ten buildings. The principal among them were the Parker House and the White Pine Bank. Losses \$70,000; insurance, unknown.

CAIRO, Sept. 22.—A dispatch from the French consul at Khartoum has been received confirming previous reports that the siege of that city had been raised. The dispatch further states that the country in the neighborhood of Khartoum is freed from rebels, and the obtaining of food supplies is comparatively easy.

PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 22.—A fire last night destroyed a whole block, including the Esmond House, the leading hotel of the city. It started in a hay yard and spread with such rapidity that all efforts to save the hotel were unavailing. The total loss is \$120,000. The principal losses are the Esmond Hotel, \$80,000; Wade, Wright & Co., agricultural implements, \$12,000; Everding Fearrell, commission merchant, \$5,000; Tatum & Bowen, 5,000; Donald McLeary, \$10,000. The insurance is \$90,000, of which the hotel and its contents represents \$65,000. All of the guests at the hotel were saved. Among them were Lawrence Barrett and Louis Ganes and wife. They saved their personal effects.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 22.—James Gordon Bennett, accompanied by Chas. Nordhoff, of the New York Herald, arrived this afternoon. He was met by John W. Mackey, who later in the day pointed out to him the prominent features of the city. The train on which he arrived narrowly escaped a serious disaster. As it pulled out of Port Costa station it ran into a train of wheat cars. Mackey and Dey were in Bennett's private car and were thrown to the floor. Bennett was badly shaken, but managed to keep his seat. Four wheat cars were wrecked and the passenger engine damaged. No one was seriously hurt.

VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., Sept. 22.—The tug Rescue, with two pontoons of 175 tons floating capacity each, arrived at the wreck of the Tallapoosa this morning. When the other pontoons have arrived from the wreck of the State of Maine an attempt will be made to raise the sunken vessel.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Sept. 22.—An assignment was placed on record today from the great whisky corporation, the Newcomb-Buchanan company, the largest of the kind in the South, and one of the largest in the Union. Other assignments also for the benefit of creditors, were filed.

CHICAGO, Sept. 22.—This afternoon thirteen roughs from the northern suburbs of the city visited the outlying town of Niles, where certain members of the party were worsted in a fight last Sunday. An attempt on the part of the gang to wreak vengeance on the individuals who had incurred their wrath led to a disturbance bordering on the proportions of a riot. Stones, clubs and pistols were used with serious results to numbers of the combatants. So far as reported, however, the only man fatally injured was Joseph Ghessell, a Niles gardener, who received a bullet wound, producing instant death. The invaders escaped from Niles in a wagon, pursued for a long distance by a crowd of infuriated citizens, headed by the local constabulary. They were finally captured by the Lake View police and lodged in the village jail, where, it is feared, violent revenge will be attempted.


