

## RECEPTION PLANNED FOR VISITING WOMEN

WIVES OF SENATORS AND REPRESENTATIVES TO BE ENTERTAINED AT CAPITOL.

Helena, Jan. 8.—Contrary to an announcement made yesterday, Speaker McDowell did not announce the house committees today. He said he had not completed the assignments, but would report on Monday. Both houses held short sessions and at noon adjourned until Monday afternoon. Tonight a large majority of the members have returned to their homes. Among the announcements out of the routine made in both houses was one to the effect that the wives of the state officers would give a reception Monday afternoon in the governor's reception room in honor of the wives of representatives and senators. The senate had a short routine session, four bills being introduced and two notices given. The bills introduced follow:

Donlan—Exempting from assessment and taxation mortgages on real property.

Meyer—Authorizing the employment of a stenographer by the state treasurer at a salary of \$1,200 a year.

Donlan—Reserving coal rights to the commonwealth in all state lands which may hereafter be sold. In brief, the measure retains for the state all coal contained in these lands.

Donlan—Relating to the disqualification of judges.

The following notices of bills were given:

Donlan—Relating to the creation, organization and operation of irrigating ditches.

McCarthy—Relative to the investment of state educational institution funds.

Usual Custom.

The house followed its usual custom today by making additions to the payroll. They consisted of two stenographers, Miss Bushnell of Lewis and Clark and Miss Sadler of Missoula. Likewise the house continued to fill the bill hopper. Ten bills were introduced, making the total 18 and notices of 14 others were given. Among the bills were those to defray the legislative expenses.

Gray of Cascade gave notice of one bill that will probably have many supporters. It proposes the installation of whipping posts for the punishment of wife-beaters and men who live off fallen women. The following bills were introduced:

Wilhelm—Providing for additions and improvements at the school for the deaf, blind and feeble-minded at Boulder. Total, \$15,350.

Wilhelm—Appropriation for the erection of hospital and other improvements at the school for the deaf, blind and feeble-minded at Boulder. Total, \$25,000.

Burke—Appropriation to pay the per diem of officers and attaches of the eleventh assembly. Total, \$25,000.

Burke—Appropriation to defray the incidental expenses of the eleventh assembly. Total, \$10,000.

Burke—Appropriation to pay the mileage and per diem of members of the eleventh assembly. Total, \$45,000.

Gray—To amend section 6265 and to

repeal section 6264, revised codes, relating to judges.

### Concerning Taxation.

Whaley—Concerning taxation of real estate encumbered by mortgages.

Duncan—Appropriation for the state orphan's home at Twin Bridges. Total, \$41,000.

Duncan—Providing for the joint incorporation of two or more religious, benevolent or social corporations at the same time.

Kilgallon—To repeal section 2108, penal code, section 3939, revised codes, and to enact in lieu thereof a new section, to be known as section 3939, revised codes; provides for the appointment of an attorney by the judge upon application, when the county attorney fails to prosecute or is derelict in his duty.

Notices of bills were given as follows:

Warren—Regulating the hours of state engineers and firemen.

Hutchinson—To amend section 1303, revised statutes of Montana, relating to the salary of the chaplain of the soldiers' home.

Gray—To amend section 2982, revised statutes, defining a legal fence.

Gray—To provide a whipping post for wife-beaters and vagrants who live upon the earnings of fallen women.

Duncan—An appropriation of money for the state orphan's home at Twin Bridges for maintenance during the months of January and February in 1909.

### Tie Votes.

Clayberg—To provide for the procedure in cases of the votes in state, county and city elections.

Burke—To amend sections 6373 and 6375, revised codes, being sections 370 and 372, part 1, title 4 of the code of the revised codes, 1907, being section 372, part 1, title 4 of the codes of civil procedure, 1905, relating to stenographers of the district court, their duties, qualifications and compensations.

Whaley—To amend sections 8582, 8583, 8505, revised codes, 1907, relating to carrying concealed weapons.

Wilhelm—To define the duties and powers of county surveyors and to provide for their compensation.

Keisley—To appropriate money to pay the bounty claims of a certain person.

Warren—Relating to telephone and telegraph operators who shall have a certificate from the state railway commission as to their competency before being employed by railway companies to handle train orders governing the movement of trains.

Frank—Providing for payment of traveling expenses of state officers.

Frank—To ratify action of the person revising codes of Montana in numbering sections thereof.

Ellis—To prohibit the establishing and maintenance of social clubs at which liquors are sold in towns and villages of less than 300 inhabitants. Also regulating the wholesale liquor business in such towns and villages.

### INVADE RELIGIOUS FIELD.

New York, Jan. 8.—Socialists in New York are to extend their field of activities so as to include religion. According to an announcement the New York section of the socialist party have already established a socialist Sunday school in Manhattan. Similar schools are to be opened in all the five boroughs where history and similar subjects are to be taught from the viewpoint of socialism.

### PLAY GAME OF GOLF.

Augusta, Ga., Jan. 8.—The president-elect, with his secretary of state, Mr. Knox, played a game of golf and spent the remainder of the day in conference on the makeup of the Taft cabinet. No political callers came today.

## SELWAY'S BILL CUTS APPROPRIATIONS

BEAVERHEAD SENATOR PROPOSES A LAW TO CHANGE FINANCIAL SYSTEM.

Helena, Jan. 8.—The bill introduced by Senator Selway relating to the funds of the several state educational institutions is a rather voluminous measure and would involve noted changes. It provides that all moneys received from the investment of the permanent funds of the University of Montana, the agricultural college, the school of mines, the state normal school, the state reform school, the deaf and dumb institute, and all moneys received from the leasing of lands granted to said institutions shall at the close of each calendar month be deposited with the state treasurer for each of such institutions to the credit of what shall be known and designated as the "interest and income fund" of each said institution.

It provides further that the money received by the state treasurer under the provisions of section 1 of the act as above enumerated shall be paid out by him only on warrant issued by the state auditor in payment of claims for expense actually incurred for the support and maintenance of such institutions filling the same, and the state auditor shall not draw warrants on said interest and income funds for any such claim until after the claim has been duly filed with and audited and approved by the state board of examiners.

### Payment of Claims.

In the payment of claims presented by any of the institutions named in the act and the interest and income funds available for the payment of the items set out in said claim, shall be exhausted before any warrants shall be drawn against the appropriation made by the state out of the general fund for the maintenance of the institution filing the claim and to the extent of the aggregate amounts to the credit of the interest and income funds of such institutions of the general fund for the maintenance of the institution filing the claim for their support and maintenance from the general fund shall be decreased, provided that when the interest and income funds of such institutions becomes larger annually than the amount appropriated for the support and maintenance of such institutions, that the entire amount shall be paid only from the interest and income fund.

### Quarterly Report.

It further provides that on the first of March, first of June, first of September and first of December of each year the executive board of each of the institutions named shall prepare or cause to be prepared a detailed statement showing all the expenses incurred and all disbursements made by such institution during the preceding quarter and the purposes for which the same was made, out of the funds, if any, appropriated by the United States government for the maintenance and support of any such institutions. Such reports shall be signed and verified under oath by the president of the executive board and treasurer of the institution making the same, and shall be filed with the board of examiners.

### Must Make Estimates.

The executive board of each of the institutions shall, at the end of November of each even numbered year, beginning with November 30, 1910, prepare or cause to be prepared a full detailed statement showing the moneys if any, received by such institution from the federal government and of the moneys received from the investment of the permanent school funds of the institutions and of moneys received from the leasing of lands granted to such institutions, and all money appropriated by the state of Montana out of the general fund for such institution, and all money received from tuition or any other sources whatever during the two years preceding the 30th day of November. It shall also contain a statement of estimated income from governmental or other sources and verified by oath of the executive officers.

San Quentin, Cal., Jan. 8.—Thomas Fallon, who killed his wife in San Francisco in 1904, was hanged at the state penitentiary here today. The drop fell at 10 o'clock and physicians pronounced life extinct 15 minutes later. The execution was successful in every particular. Fallon walked calmly to the gallows, accompanied by Father Walsh.

While ascending the steps he was engaged in prayer and upon reaching the trap he looked upward and exclaimed in a clear voice:

"Sacred heart of Jesus, have mercy on my soul."

The black cap was then adjusted and he died without a sign of weakness.

It was only through the prompt action of the young woman that the lives of her charges were saved. Miss Deisher saved four children before she herself was overcome. Neighboring women found the entire school in a comatose state.

### BODY FOUND IN SEA.

Hamburg, Jan. 8.—The body of Lieutenant Foertsch, the German aeronaut, who lost his life at sea last October was picked up in the North sea two days ago by the fishing steamer Orion. Lieutenant Foertsch started in the international balloon race October 2. He ascended, together with his companion, in the German balloon Herzell. The balloon was picked up October 17 140 miles northwest of Heligoland. All the other aeronauts have been accounted for except Lieutenant Foertsch's companion.

New York, Jan. 8.—Archbishop Farley has granted a dispensation for the marriage of Miss Beatrice Mills, grand-daughter of D. O. Mills, to the Earl of Granard. The earl, who recently arrived here from England, is a Catholic, while Miss Mills is a protestant. The wedding will be held

in this city on the afternoon of January 14.
