CANADIAN RAILROADS PREPARE TO EXTEND

Calgary, Alberta, Jan. 11.—The Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Northern railways are negotiating with the Dominion government for the purchase of R. N. W. M. P. barracks, property in this city at the foot of Eighth avenue. The railways intend to use this property for a union station. Negotiations are well under way and are certain to go through. They will be closed in a few days. These negotiations have followed the development of the Alberta government railway policy, and indicate that under the new conditions the two roads need this property at once. This is another indication that one or both roads will be in Calgary this year. It is expected that three roads will come into Calgary—the Canadian railway from Saskatoon; the Canadian Northern from Vegreville, and the Grand Trunk Pacific from Hardisty. One or more of the roads will reach Calgary before the end of the year. Probably two of the roads will be extended south at an early date, with a view to connecting with large American cities in the west.

Conductor W. W. Berry of the Coeur d'Alene line has been appointed temporary trainmaster, with jurisdiction over the service in the Missoula yards. Mr. Berry was placed in charge of the passenger trains which were held up here during the storm and watched over the comfort of the stormbound passengers.

H. O. Flickenger, agent for the Northern Pacific at Clinton, spent yesterday in Missoula on business. Mr. Flickenger is contemplating a trip to California, where he expects to spend the winter, and hopes to leave for the west in about two weeks.

H. C. McGee, assistant engineer on the east district of the Rocky Mountain division, left yesterday for St. Paul, where he will visit with relatives for two weeks.

Chief Surgeon Courtney of the Northern Pacific Beneficial association, with headquarters in St. Paul, left here yesterday, after a stay of three days in Missoula. Dr. Courtney came here especially to inspect the company's infirmary at this place.

Dispatcher A. G. Workman of the Northern Pacific is making a periodical trip over the division.

Mrs. W. E. Dauchy, wife of Division Engineer Dauchy, is making preparations to leave for the east, where she will spend the remaining winter months.

District Master Mechanic Frank Rush of the Puget Sound line, with headquarters at Seattle, was in Missoula yesterday and left last night for Spokane, where he will spend several days inspecting the motive power on the new line. Mr. Rush has been on this division for the past three days and reports the power situation very satisfactory.

WORKING ON TUNNELS.

The local Milwaukee officials announced yesterday that the contractors had completed half the concreting of the Bonita tunnel and hope to reach the west portal of the tunnel by March 1. A large force of men is engaged day and night lining the Garrison tunnel, and hopes are entertained that this will be completed by February 1, when the company expects to begin laying steel west from Garrison. The tunnel is located about a mile and a half west of Garrison and is 1,978 feet long.
