

DISMISSAL OF KAI DISCUSSED

AMERICAN AND BRITISH MINISTERS CALL UPON PRINCE CHANG OF CHINA.

Pekin, Jan. 15.—W. W. Rockhill, the American minister, and W. W. Jordan, the British minister today called upon Prince Chang, president of the foreign board, and made representations on the subject of the recent dismissal from office of Yuan Shi Kai, a member of the grand council. This step was taken independently of the other diplomatic representatives in Peking and without previous communication of the intention to the foreign board. The ministers proceeded in accordance with the recommendations made by them with their respective governments.

The diplomats here are so divided on the question of approaching China in regard to the dismissal of Yuan Shi Kai that the American and British representatives had to act alone. They disclaim any intervention, but it is thought they objected to the dismissal.

The government desires to hold a formal reception of the diplomatic corps, at which the regime of Prince Chun will be reorganized, and its wish is due partly to the reception abroad of the news of Yuan Shi Kai's dismissal as well as local press comment thereon. The diplomats, however, are deliberating the suggestions and it is not likely that the British and American ministers will signify their acceptance before the regent gives his reasons for the dismissal of Yuan Shi Kai, together with assurances for the future.

FLOODS THREATENED IN WASHINGTON NOW

Bellingham Wash. Jan. 15.—The Chinook accompanied by some rain is tearing through the mountains of northwestern Washington at the rate of 50 miles an hour and the snow is disappearing before it like magic. The hills, which were covered with two and three feet of snow last night, are bare this morning. It is raining steadily throughout the Skagit valley and water is pouring over the coating of ice on the streams. Telephone reports from the Skagit and Nooksack river towns say the people are preparing for the worst flood in their history. With the break-up of the ice, bridges and booms are almost certain to go out. In the government weather bureau here last night registered a rise of 35 degrees in 12 hours, from 29 above zero to 56 above.
