TEACHER WILL FIGHT SCHOOL FUND MEASURE

Wallace, Jan. 16.—Miss Frances Wilson, superintendent of public instruction in Shoshone county, will head a strenuous fight in the state legislature against the proposed passage of a bill rearranging the method of distributing the school funds collected from the sale of state and county licenses. Senator Rowton of Idaho county is the originator of the bill.

The Rowton bill provides that 50 per cent of the license money collected in each school district shall go to the general county school fund, instead of going to the fund of each separate school district. Miss Wilson and prominent local educators maintain that the result will be disastrous if the school fund of the larger districts is thus depleted to aid the districts where license collections are small, the country sparsely settled and the school attendance at a minimum. The smaller districts are now wealthy, compared to the cost of the maintenance of their schools when contrasted with the revenues and necessary expenditures for school maintenance in the larger districts.

SAILORS DISCOVER BODIES OF CHENEYS

Washington, Jan. 16.—The bodies of the American consul, Arthur S. Cheney and Mrs. Cheney were found in the ruins of the American consulate at Messina yesterday afternoon by the sailors of the American battleship Illinois, which arrived at Messina yesterday from Suez. The bodies were prepared for shipment and taken aboard the American supply ship Cutler, which will carry them to Naples. Arrangements are being made for the shipment of the bodies to the United States. Having accomplished her mission at Messina the Illinois has returned to Malta.
