MISSOULA ASSOCIATION TAKES OUT ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.

Yesterday articles of incorporation, filed late Saturday by a committee of the Missoula club, were made public. The change in organization was decided on at a meeting held last week and the articles give the usual aims and purposes of social organizations.

The members of the organization held an enthusiastic meeting on Friday night last and appointed a committee to look after the incorporation of the club. A constitution and bylaws were proposed and were adopted by the members. The committee attended to its duty faithfully and Saturday night articles of incorporation were filed under the laws of Montana. At the same meeting a new set of officers were elected to serve the new club for the next year. Those elected were as follows: C. L. F. Kellogg, president; F. C. This suggestion was accepted and Mr. Sibley was appointed a committee of one to look after this part. He has made arrangements with the various fraternities and college men to have them decorate the space assigned to them with pennants, representing the fraternities and colleges. Under the banners of each organization will be a list, which will show the names of the fraternity men in the city.

QUARANTINE RUMOR IS ONLY HALF TRUE

There was a rumor afloat yesterday to the effect that the county jail had been quarantined on account of one of the prisoners having broken out with smallpox. This was only partly true--true in the fact that there was a case of the disease discovered in the jail, but there was no quarantine. It appears that last Saturday night Officer Beeson took to the bastille a man named Frank Payne, who claimed to be sick and was put in the care of the county. On Sunday afternoon Payne broke out with a rash and Sheriff Graham became alarmed and called in County Physician Thurman. Dr. Thurman could not diagnose the case positively as smallpox, but ordered the removal of the victim to the county detention hospital, where it developed yesterday that he was suffering with a mild attack of the disease. However, Sheriff Graham was not officially notified that the disease was smallpox and therefore the jail was not quarantined.

In the meantime, however, orders had been given by the sheriff not to admit anyone to the jail and also not to release any of the prisoners, pending the outcome of the case. The jail will be fumigated and then all danger from contagion will be abolished.
