**FRANKHAUSER TRIAL BEGINS AT HELENA**

Helena, Jan. 19.—A jury was empaneled and two witnesses were put on the stand today in the federal court in the case against George Frankhauser, charged with having held up, jointly with Charles McDonald, the Oriental limited at Rondo, Mont., Sept. 12, 1907, when the mail car was robbed and \$40,000 secured.  
District Attorney Freeman in his opening statement to the jury told at length of the robbery, the flight and the subsequent arrest of Frankhauser and McDonald. While the holdup was in progress the mask slipped from Frankhauser's face and a trainman named Pierson got a good look at him and was able to identify him later positively as one of the bandits.

**MURDER AND SUICIDE.**

Seattle, Jan. 19.—A coroner's jury found this afternoon that William L. Seeley killed his wife, Kate M. Seeley and daughter, Rene Seeley by hitting them over the head with some blunt instrument and subsequently submerging their heads in water. No autopsies were held on the bodies of the two women so that the jury concluded that their deaths were due to this combination of circumstances. The jury also found that William L. Seeley came to his death by suffocation following a dose of chloroform.
