

SELECTION OF JURY SLOW WORK

TASK OF SECURING TRIAL PANEL IN PATRICK CALHOUN CASE IS DIFFICULT.

San Francisco, Jan. 19.—Today's proceedings, opening the second week of the trial of Patrick Calhoun upon an indictment charging the offer of a bribe to a San Francisco supervisor, resulted in no addition to the three men who were temporarily passed last week, and it was evident that many days will elapse before the taking of testimony is begun.

The preliminary examination by Judge William P. Lawlor was prolonged until within an hour of adjournment and of the men whose names were actually placed in the box but three were questioned. Two of these admitted bias, and the third, a former street car conductor, who was discharged by the United Railroads prior to the first strike of its employees, had been passed by the defense and was under interrogation by Assistant District Attorney Francis J. Heney when the day's proceedings ended.

NEVADA CLUB WOMAN URGES REFORM SCHOOL

Reno, Nev., Jan. 19.—Mrs. Louise Earl Williams, a well-known club woman of this city, is circulating petitions requesting that measures be introduced in the legislature for the creation of state reform schools. Mrs. Williams desires to have wayward youths under 18 years of age disciplined under state supervision, while with regard to girls, she believes that a provision should be incorporated into the proposed bill making it compulsory for mothers to retain possession of their daughters until they are 21 years of age, claiming that such would have the effect of lessening the waywardness of young women.

TEACHER IS MISSING.

Bellingham, Jan. 19.—Miss Catherine Montgomery, a critic teacher at the Northwest Washington Normal school here, is believed to have perished in the Italian earthquake. On December 22 she wrote friends from Rome stating she was leaving that evening for Messina. For the past week since the letter was received here every effort has been made to locate her by cable, but without result and it is presumed she perished in the disaster. Miss Montgomery was detailed from the college last summer to make a year's study of European schools.

PASSES HOUSE. Washington, Jan. 19.—The pension appropriation bill as amended was passed by the house today.

During the consideration of the bill Representative Taylor precipitated a debate on the proposed consolidation of the pension agencies of offering an amendment providing that the salaries of the 17 pension agents which the bill proposes to establish be continued.

The amendment continues in operation the pension agencies now existing, 17 of which the bill proposes to abolish, was defeated by a vote of 124 to 71.
