

LITTLE PAUPERISM IN HAWAII

CONDITIONS IN ISLAND TERRITORY ARE NOT FAVORABLE FOR ITS DEVELOPMENT.

Honolulu, Jan. 26.—The absence of beggars or any kind of mendicants upon the streets of Honolulu is one of the things which is always remarked with surprise by strangers who have traveled to any extent, especially outside of the United States.

The Chinese and Japanese in Hawaii are never beggars. With a very small exception they are industrious and amiable, and generally look after the needs of their incapacitated fellow countrymen.

Foreign Trait. Among a very few of the older Portuguese, of which nationality there are about 25,000 in the territory, there is a tendency towards professional pauperism—a trait probably brought from Europe, but which is severely discountenanced by the younger generation and will probably disappear in course of time.

There are a number of well organized charitable societies and eleemosynary institutions in Hawaii, the chief work of which, however, is to assist the children and women of the poor of the various races. The Associated Charities is doing good work in this line, while the various Christian churches have social settlements established in various parts of the oriental quarter.

Free Dispensary. The territorial board of health maintains a free dispensary in Honolulu, at which free medical and surgical treatment is given those unable to pay for such service.
