VOIGHT WING CASE.

Washington, Feb. 1.—The case of the Continental Wall Paper company versus Lewis Voight & Sons of Cincinnati was today decided by the supreme court of the United States in Voight's favor. The suit was brought by the company on a debt of \$50,000, the payment of which was resisted on the ground that the paper company is a trust. In effect the decision holds that an admitted trust, organized contrary to the Sherman anti-trust law, cannot use the court to collect debts.

Ossining, N. Y., Feb. 1.—Salvatore Governale was put to death in the electric chair at Sing Sing prison to-day for the murder of the two New York city policemen, George Zeigler and Albert A. Silcock, on Sunday afternoon, April 14, 1908. The double murder followed a fight in Washing-ton Square park during which Govern-ale fired a revolver at a fellow coun-tryman. He shot and killed the offi-cers who attempted to arrest him.
