OFFICIALS APPROVE ORDINANCE

MEASURE REGULATING PLUMBING WORK RECOMMENDED BY HEALTH OFFICERS.

At the next meeting of the city council it is likely that the new plumbing ordinance, read to the aldermen last Monday evening, will become a city law.

"We have the approval of Dr. Pease, the city physician, and of Health Marshal May," said the plumber, "and almost every doctor in town has stated that he considered the plan for inspecting plumbing one that would do a whole lot of good."

"If the ordinance is passed, every job will have to bear the approval of the inspector, who is to be appointed by the mayor, before it can be accepted. The inspector will be paid a small fee for each piece of inspection work, but the city will not be asked to bear this expense. The master plumbers will be required to pay a higher annual license fee under the new law and everything will tend to insure the turning out of first-class work."

"All of the work that has been done up to now will, of course, stand without inspection, but not a single new piece will go unless the inspector says that it's all right. Anybody that knows what trouble can result from bad work on the part of a plumber will appreciate the value of the new ordinance."
