CHARTER DAY PLANS ARE COMPLETE

E. C. DAY OF HELENA WILL DELIVER ADDRESS AT UNIVERSITY CELEBRATION.

The University of Montana will celebrate Charter day, the anniversary of the bill creating the institution, Friday, February 19, the celebration beginning with exercises in Convocation hall in the forenoon, and closing with the Red Apple banquet in the evening. Faculty, students, alumni and patrons and friends of the institution will unite in the annual observance of the founding of the state university.

Of particular interest will be the visit of the members of the legislature, who have been extended a special invitation by President Dunlavy, as announced yesterday in the Missoulian. Another annual part of the observance of the day will be the dedication of the new library building just recently completed. At this time the building commission, composed of J. M. Evans, Dr. O. J. Craig and J. H. T. Ryman, will formally turn over the building to the president of the university.

Hon. E. C. Day of Helena, who is known as one of the leading men of the state most interested in educational matters, will deliver the principal address of the day. In addition to the address of Mr. Day there will be several other addresses and speeches at the morning exercises. Invitations have been mailed to a large number of people throughout the state, and it is expected that there will be many visitors from out of town to attend Charter day exercises and the Red Apple banquet. The program as announced yesterday is as follows: 10:30—Exercises, Convocation hall; address, Hon. E. C. Day of Helena. 12:00 to 1:30—Lunch, Woman's hall. 2:00—Dedication of the library building. 1:30 to 5:00—Inspection of the laboratories. 4:00—Basketball game. 9:00—Red Apple banquet.

Dr. Fluno was educated at Wisconsin university in Madison. During the civil war he was a volunteer soldier in the Forty-first Wisconsin regiment, and served until that regiment was discharged. He studied at the Homeopathic school in Iowa City, and in the Chicago Homeopathic Medical college, and became a practitioner in Chicago. In 1885 he began the pursuit of "Science and Health With Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker G. Eddy, then in its thirteenth edition, and during the third reading of this book he found that he could no longer administer drugs to the sick.

In the same year he entered the Massachusetts Metaphysical college, and two years later he completed the normal course under Mrs. Eddy's instructions, and then went to the Pacific coast, where, in Oakland, Calif., for 20 years he has been engaged in Christian Science work.

In 1898 he was appointed on the board of lectureship of the mother church in Boston, Mass.

CANADIAN MINERS HOLD CONVENTION

Lethbridge, Alberta, Feb. 6.—The seventh annual convention of the United Mine Workers of district No. 18, comprising western Canada, was held here yesterday. It was decided to allow orientals to become members of the union, North Dakota was made a sub-division of this district. The union decided to break away from the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada on the ground that the congress was unprogressive.
