

TOO WEAK TO TALK TO REPORTERS

ARIZONA MINING MAN WHO WAS SHANGHAIED IS SUFFERING FROM INJURIES.

Tacoma, Feb. 8.—So weak was the condition of A. A. Cox, general manager of the Arizona & Pittsburg Mine & Smelting company of Tucson, Ariz., today that visitors and reporters were denied admission to his rooms at St. Joseph's hospital. It was said that he will receive visitors in a few days. While there is an air of mystery about his experience, he is said to speak like a man who is holding back a story of great wrong done him. Asked if he would give the name of the ship on which he had been so long, he replied that he did not know the ship's name. The ship will land at San Francisco again in a few days. "If my friends and the public have been able to wait for several weeks to learn the details of my disappearance, they can now wait another day," he said. He complained of having a sprained back and legs, and declared he lost 20 pounds in weight since falling into the hands of his abductors.

SENATE POSTPONES ACTION ON MEASURE

Sacramento, Feb. 8.—Only five senators favored agitation of the anti-Japanese question when the matter was called up this morning by Marc Anthony of San Francisco. The senate decided by a vote of 25 to 5 to defer until next Thursday its action upon the report of the committee on executive communications, advising against legislation aimed at the Japanese. Senator J. B. Sanford introduced a joint resolution asking congress to include Japanese in the provisions of the Geary exclusion act. Senator Anthony's bill providing for submitting to the voters at the next state election the question of permitting or prohibiting Asiatic immigration was favorably reported this morning.

MISDEMEANOR TO SEE A PRIZE FIGHT EVEN

Sacramento, Feb. 8.—Senator John P. Hare introduced in the senate today a bill aimed at prize fighting that is much more drastic than the measure presented by Senator Willis a week ago. It not only prohibits all fist fights where fees are charged for admission, but makes it a misdemeanor to witness a prize fight, the maximum penalty for this offense being \$500.
