WASH CHICKEN FEET BY ELECTRIC MACHINE

One of the most novel uses for the electric motor is reported from Nevada, Iowa. A man who is extensively engaged in the poultry business has rigged up a revolving brush driven by a small electric motor for washing the feet of newly killed fowls before shipment.

The automatic electric egg-boilers, like those on the Lusitania and Mauritania, are able to cook 200 eggs at once, clock arrangement causing the basket containing the eggs to hop out of the water at any half minute up to six minutes. Another novelty is a self-dumping oyster-cooker for stews.

The first rotary converter in America, as well as the largest, was built by the General Electric company. These machines are used to change alternating current into direct current for street railway service.

THE WHIPPING POST PLANS TO OBSERVE AS A CURE LINCOLN DAY

CANADA PROPOSES THIS MEANS OF DEALING WITH "WHITE SLAVE" TRAFFIC.

Chicago, Feb. 9.—According to information furnished to the United States district attorney's office, the official disclosures here regarding the white slave traffic in the United States probably will cause the Canadian parliament to add to the criminal code both the whipping post and prison punishment for culprits found guilty of similar traffic in girls. This drastic punishment is now being urged by the Moral and Social Reform council of Canada which represents over four million members of churches, labor organizations and farmers' granges of Canada and its recommendations are not likely to be disregarded. The information to federal prosecutors was in a letter to the Woman's World, a Chicago magazine which is conducting a crusade against the white slave evil, from Secretary J. G. Shearer, of the reform council. These and others about white slavery have been turned over to their officials for their guidance in determining the step most likely to exterminate the traffic. The reform council asked of all America to endorse this work that is carrying succor to the poor of the country in Lincoln's name. Whatever else of temporary tribute this city sees, it is believed the lasting Lincoln memorial will be found in this national tribute to the cause of all humanity.

Business Burglary.
