HERBERT UNDERTAKES BIG TASK

TRYING TO GET DEMOCRATIC HOUSE AND REPUBLICAN SENATE IN HARMONY.

Helena, Feb. 10.—The move toward getting the democratic house and the republican senate to act together on a primary law was made today in the house by Representative Herbert of Flathead county.

Whereas, The party platforms of both the republican party and democratic party, represented in the eleventh legislative assembly, promised and agreed to enact a primary election law, and

Resolved, The senate concurring, that a committee of two members of this house be appointed, one by the chairman of the republican caucus and one by the chairman of the democratic caucus, to meet with a like committee of senators, appointed in like manner by the respective chairmen of the republican and democratic caucuses of the senate, to prepare and report at its earliest possible convenience, a bill which shall comply with and make effective the declarations of said party platform.

After some discussion the resolution was adopted by a viva voce vote. There is a division of sentiment as to what the result of the adoption of the resolution may be.

Headlight Bill. Senator Sanders' headlight bill, which provides that all engines save switch engines shall be equipped with headlights of not less than 1,500-candle power, went through the committee of the whole in the house today without a negative vote.

Mr. Smith in his reply declared the treaty had not been prepared by former Secretary Root, but that it was the work of Chandler Anderson, a New York lawyer, who had been engaged by the state department on various occasions in connection with treaties affecting the relations of this country and Canada.

Several bills having to do with coal miners, which were introduced by Senator Meyer, and which run the gamut of several committees, were, in spite of the protest of the Carbon county senator, referred to the judiciary committee for the purpose of inquiring into the question of their constitutionality.

Senator Tilman interrupted with the remark that he hoped Massachusetts and Michigan would clinch, but he supposed there were too many centuries of culture in the Massachusetts member to permit anything commonplace.

After a long debate members of the foreign relations committee suggested that they be permitted to consider the treaty. It was not recommended, but the discussion will be resumed Monday.
