

INCREASE IN SALARY REPEALED

BILL PASSED BY SENATE ENABLING KNOX TO BECOME SECRETARY OF STATE.

Washington, Feb. 11.—A report was made to the senate from the committee on appropriations relative to the president's statements concerning the attitude of congress toward appropriations for the support of the secret service. Senator Hemenway, who presented this report, added that the president was not justified in making the statement contained in his message to congress.

Just before adjournment today the senate passed a resolution in the exact form which it had been passed by the house, declaring Feb. 12 to be a special legal holiday in the District of Columbia and the territories in honor of the centenary of the birth of Lincoln.

A bill was passed also repealing the increase in the salary of the secretary of state from \$8,000 to \$12,000, so as to permit Senator Knox to accept appointment as secretary of state.

Secretary McLaughlin made a speech in opposition to the passage of any bill for the readjustment of the negro soldiers of the Twenty-fifth regiment accused of having "shot up" Brownsville.

The senate, at 4:56 p. m., adjourned until Monday.

BELL FOUND GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER

Denver, Feb. 11.—Within less than two hours after argument of counsel had ended this afternoon the jury in the case of Burdette Bell, who shot Custer Dury to death a month ago, returned a verdict of guilty of voluntary manslaughter. Contrary to expectations, Bell did not plead the "unwritten law," but justified the shooting of Dury on the ground that he was defending his own life.

During the trial Bell's wife told the story of her relations with Dury, saying that she was attracted to him by his promise of a career on the stage. The shooting occurred in the hallway of a room house where Dury and Mrs. Bell had been living together.


