FRUIT MEN RETURN FROM MEETING

HORTICULTURISTS PRAISE CONVENTION AT HAMILTON. OBSERVATIONS.

Yesterday morning the Missoula delegation to the twelfth annual meeting of the Montana Horticultural society headed by M. J. Elrod, T. T. Black and F. J. Erfert, and accompanied by P. J. Shannon and W. B. Harlan of the Bitter Root capital, L. D. O'Donnell of Billings, Chemist Mendelson of the Billings sugar factory, and well, a crowd of horticulturists that filled the branch train to the garden-reached Missoula. Many of the members residing in other parts of the state stopped to look the town over and were as well pleased as were the local people with what they saw. "It's good to get home again," said a Missoula horticulturist. "We had a good time at Hamilton and I can't say too much for the royal reception the people of that town extended to us, but Missoula looks good to me again."

"I am more than pleased with the meeting at Hamilton," said a man who had not missed a single session. "The papers read were excellent, the suggestions made and accepted are bound to prove of value; the spirit of the organization was never higher than it is right now. The members of the association, especially the newly elected officers, realize that the work of the society does not stop with its annual meeting and the organization is going to make itself felt this summer."

"One of the most interesting features of the week was the election of officers and the most remarkable incident of the balloting was the election of the secretary-treasurer. When the time came for the selection of this official, whose position is, perhaps, the most important of any of the society's leaders, there were just 52 voting members present. R. A. Cooley of Brown presented the name of M. J. Elrod of Missoula and there were 51 seconds to the nomination. We have selected a good set of officers, I think, and the horticulture society should boom during the coming year."

"You would be surprised at the number of college men that are located in the Bitter Root and in and near Hamilton," continued the horticulturist. "Why, near Durbey there are four men on adjoining ranches who are all graduates of Yale and men with degrees are almost as plentiful as McIntosh Red and that, you know, is going some. Among the college men interested in the Bitter Root valley is Dr. C. R. Williams, Minnesota's famous football coach, and he is at present in Hamilton. I tell you, you can't throw a brick in any direction in the entire valley without crippling a bachelor of arts."
