ROCK SPRINGS MONARCH COAL

NEWS OF PARADISE

Special to The Daily Missoulian.

Paradise, Feb. 18.—Assistant Coal Dock Manager George Aurelius sustained painful, though not serious, injuries Tuesday afternoon by losing his equilibrium and taking a high dive into the dock. Yardmaster Flinn converted the "95" into an ambulance and rushed the injured party to Plains for medical assistance.

A second large tank is under construction for storage of creosote at the tie plant. The work is being rapidly pushed by an Ohio firm, and when completed will take care of surplus foreign tanks arriving.

Division Superintendent J. M. Rapelle, T. B. Coker and "Tom" Chester were in town looking over the yards and other improvements.

Since the opening of the Paradise-St. Regis cut-off 75 eastbound trains and over 9,000 tons have been moved over the "easy" route.

Major Christenson and a troop of Japanese have hoisted nearly 100 cars of ice into the Northern Pacific storage plant.

An election will be held soon to decide whether or not the town of Paradise shall be incorporated.
