

HIS FIGHT HAS ONLY COMMENCED

RAINEY DECLARES HE MERELY SCRATCHED THE SURFACE IN PANAMA AFFAIR.

Washington, Feb. 22.—Asserting that his recent speech in the house relative to the purchase by the United States government of the Panama canal had brought upon himself "vilification and misrepresentation and abuse almost without a parallel in the history of that body," Representative Rainey of Illinois today denounced in the house of representatives a lengthy speech in reply to the charges that the information upon which his remarks were based was obtained from "ex-convicts and blackmailers," this accusation having been made openly in the house by representative Lovering of Massachusetts.

A La John Paul Jones. "True loyalty to this great enterprise," Representative Rainey said, "means that you must expose and denounce all kinds of graft in connection with it in order to avoid the pitfalls in which the French companies fell, and I propose to do this whether it meets with the approval of the next president of the United States or not. I want to say to those who are spending so much to abuse me that I have not yet commenced to fight. I have only scratched my guns on some of the least objectionable features in connection with Panama matters."

Representative Rainey declares that he did not attack the canal, but simply attacked the graft connected with the enterprise. He asserted that Representative Lovering had not attempted to deny a single fact he had

stated, but after making his charges proceeded to eulogize William Nelson Cromwell. "I never heard until he made his speech that any persons were trying to get Mr. Cromwell to purchase any alleged evidence," he said. "I knew nothing of any attempt to sell any story to the democratic national committee until the gentleman made his speech on this floor."

Made in Panama. Mr. Rainey further states that the evidence he produced in support of his charges of graft in connection with the buying of the canal, nearly all was obtained from Panama. Then he added:

"The attack I made was entirely unexpected and the next attack I made upon these gentlemen will be just as entirely unexpected by them when it comes."

Continuing, Mr. Rainey said: "Mr. Cromwell in the speech made by him through Mr. Olcott (N. Y.) has seen fit to discuss his present efforts to conclude a treaty between Colombia and Panama in which he refers to the necessity for some contribution from Panama to Colombia as her proportion of the public debt of Colombia."

Referring to these as the "proposed Cromwell treaties," Mr. Rainey asserted that Mr. Cromwell proposes to so change the Hay-Bunau Varilla treaty as to impose upon this country an additional burden of \$1,250,000. "And he proposes that this sum shall be taken from our treasury and paid, not to Panama, but to Colombia. In addition to that he proposes that for five years after 1913 the \$250,000 we agreed to pay Panama shall be paid to Colombia direct. In other words, by the treaties of which he is so proud Panama deprives herself for five years of her fixed source of revenue and consents that it be paid to Colombia, and the United States contributes from its treasury \$1,250,000 and pays it to the treasury of Colombia. I know of no precedent for Mr. Cromwell's treaties. No people in the world after successfully completing a revolution have ever been called upon to pay any portion of the debt, foreign or domestic, of the country from which they separated."

To Increase Deficit. "The situation Mr. Cromwell is endeavoring to force by the treaties is that the United States is to be required to increase its treasury deficit and to pay to Colombia \$1,250,000; Panama impoverishes herself by giving up the \$1,250,000 clearly belonging to her and give up for five years after 1913 the revenue we propose to pay her. In return for this Panama is to be admitted to the lucrative positions on the canal zone in our service and ultimately in order to permit Panama to recoup her losses on account of the Cromwell treaties she is to be permitted to levy taxes upon the army of Americans and other employees we have sent to the isthmus for the purpose of building up the canal."

THIEVES CAPTURED SHARPE TESTIFIES AT HEARING BY POSSE

HORSE RUSTLERS ARE TRAILED INTO MOUNTAINS AND ARE BROUGHT TO BAY.

Salt Lake City, Feb. 22.—A special to the Herald from Twin Falls, Idaho, says: An exciting chase after a gang of horse thieves, in which the whole countryside west of Three Creeks, Owyhee county, participated, has resulted in the capture of Frank Walsh, Jesse Coates and Ollie Tennell and the recovery of 23 horses alleged to have been stolen from the Western Shoshone Indian reservation on February 15. The men and horses were met on the trail by C. G. Winters of Elko county, Nevada. Winters was not permitted to approach them. He hurried home, secured a rifle and followed the suspects alone, leaving his wife to arouse the settlers. Mrs. Winters soon recruited a strong posse, which found no difficulty in trailing the fugitives through the snow. Winters, in the meantime, had circled the three men, and as they entered a canyon with their stock, he held them in check by firing in front of them. The posse worked so well that the posse, coming from the rear, had the muzzle of its guns in the faces of the fugitives before the latter could fire a defensive shot.

Suddenly enough the prisoners gave up their heavy armament and submitted to arrest. They reached Twin Falls today in the custody of Mr. Winters and two deputy sheriffs.

MAN ACCUSED OF COMPLICITY IN CARMACK MURDER TELLS OF THE SHOOTING.

Nashville, Tenn., Feb. 23.—When court adjourned tonight in the midst of the cross-examination of John D. Sharpe, the honors seemed divided between the state and the defense in the Cooper-Sharpe trial, for the slaying of former United States Senator Edward W. Carmack. Young Robin Cooper, under cross-examination for nearly two hours, appeared cool. The next witness and the only one for the day, was John D. Sharpe, another of the defendants.

On direct examination Sharpe swore that he saw the killing and "that Carmack fell after Robin Cooper had fired three times."

One of the bullet wounds, a necessarily fatal one, pierced the senator's neck within a sixteenth of an inch of the spinal cord and came out under the tongue. On cross-examination Sharpe said that Carmack turned his head just as the second shot was fired. He did not explain how the senator could turn his head far enough to permit the ball to enter the median line of the neck on a straight line. Sharpe left the stand with apparent relief. His faithful little wife, who has never missed a minute at his side in court, sprang up to meet him and cheered him with smiles and encouragement.

ATTEMPTS TO GET MONEY.

Toronto, Ont., Feb. 22.—Chris Holland, who is under arrest at Philadelphia, attempted to get from local banks and two express companies the sum of \$108,500, according to the police of this city. There was deposited here in nine different banks \$90,000 on alleged spurious checks, supposed to have been issued from the Third National bank of Philadelphia.
