## CAUGHT ON THE RUN ABOUT TOWN

PEOPLE YOU KNOW AND SOME OF THE THINGS THEY SAY AND DO.

Of all the band of merry Elks that departed Tuesday night at the farewell gathering in the hall, the goat which has been led away, their home ever since Hell Gate lodge was organized, there was but Exalted Ruler Logan who showed up yesterday morning to lead away the goat to its new quarters in the Harmon theater, which will be occupied until the new Elks' building is completed. And the exalted ruler was not on deck early; when Harry Chaney conducted his carpenters to the hall to begin their operations in the remodeling of the hall into hotel rooms he found the goat mournfully posing in the middle of the room, surrounded by pitfalls, death traps and a miscellaneous collection of paraphernalia. Not being acquainted with the disposition of the goat, the carpenters did not dare undertake to lead him out, as it was evident that he was not in an amiable frame of mind after his late hours the night before. So they awaited the arrival of somebody who knew the goat. In half an hour or so the exalted ruler appeared and the goat playfully recognized his authority. Everything was removed from the hall and transferred to the other street. The movement attracted considerable attention and Mr. Logan received many compliments upon his marked ability as a tamer of wild animals. Before noon the goat was stabled in the new theater building, where the Knights of Pythias had preceded the Elks, and last night the old hall was pretty well dismantled.

County Commissioner Frank Nelson has entered business in town and yesterday closed a deal that makes him more closely than ever identified with Missoula's interests. In association with Frank Cannon, Mr. Nelson has purchased the Studebaker agency here, and the business will be conducted under the firm name of the Nelson-Cannon company. Mr. Hagedorn, who has been at the head of the Studebaker establishment here since it was established, has disposed of his entire interest to the new firm, and Mr. Nelson will immediately assume the management of the establishment. Yesterday, speaking of the departure that he has taken, Mr. Nelson said: "I had to get busy at something; I have always been doing something and since I left the ranch and came to town it has been hard work to keep occupied. This opportunity seemed to me a good one, as I have had a good deal to do with wagons and I know one when I see it. I have had enough experience with engines and threshers to enable me to look after this line of the business satisfactorily, and all these things induced me to make this venture. I believe there is a broad field here for this line of merchandise, as we reasonably expect many new farmers and an extension of the operations of the old ones. I am not a tenderfoot here and I think I shall find the new work agreeable."

H. A. Wheelton, who has been teller in the First National bank for a long time, has presented his resignation, to take effect as soon as his successor can be secured. Mr. Wheelton makes this change in order that he may enter the real estate business, and as soon as he is released from the bank he will associate himself with George Brooks. Mr. Wheelton has made many friends since he came to Missoula, and he will be greatly missed by the patrons of the bank where he has been located. That he will succeed in his new venture is the wish of all these friends.

Yet another change in banking circles in this end of the state was made known here last night, when Hugh E. Bean, who has been cashier of the Drummond State bank ever since it was established, came down the river and announced that he had resigned from the institution for the purpose of taking a trip to Europe, which will keep him away for three or four months. "I expect to return to Montana," said Mr. Bean last night to a Missoulian reporter. "It is a great state and I believe there are great opportunities here. I am satisfied that Missoula will be a great city and that it is a splendid field for business endeavor. Deer Lodge, also, is going to grow rapidly; this end of the state is sure to be a winner and I shall be back here before long."

R. A. Luke, the best-known insurance man in the state of Montana, as well as in some other states, came over from Helena last night for a short visit here. He lost his way getting down town from the railway station to the hotel, and when he finally got to the Florence he wanted to know what was going on here; the town had grown so much since he was here the last time that he had lost his bearings and he asked for a guide when he went out the next time. "You're growing finely," said Mr. Luke when he had caught his breath. "The city looks livelier and better than I ever saw it before, and I am delighted now that I am located."

P. J. McElligott came in yesterday afternoon from the upper Nine Mile country, looking as if he had wintered well. IS LIVELY. He had a good word to say for the appearance of the town and said he had a fine trip in. "I think the best sleighing in the world is on the road down Nine Mile," said he. "I have seen a lot of fine sleighing, but that is the best sleigh road right now that I ever drove over. It is like coasting all the way. There is a lot of snow in the hills, and there will be good water this year. It is not going as fast with us as it is up here, and we will have sleighing for some time yet."

## WILL HOLD SPECIAL MEETING

CITY COUNCIL MEETS TONIGHT TO CONSIDER MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE.

A special meeting of the city council has been called for this evening to attend to some new and some unfinished business. The petition regarding saloons on Higgins avenue will be discussed, as will the plumbing ordinance, besides several petitions for arc lights, sidewalks and fire plugs. The matter of protecting the river bank will be further considered, and it is likely that definite action will be taken. The ordinance for a franchise to the Montana Independent Telephone company will be taken in hand and given consideration, as will the ordinance relating to the number and location of saloons. The Smith claim for damages, which the plaintiff alleges should be paid him for injuries received in a fall at the corner of Main and Patton streets, will be given a place on the program. Several protests against the vacating of the streets and alleys in Knowles and Sunnyside additions will be heard and passed on. A report from the city attorney as to the sufficiency of the bond and acceptance of J. R. Wharton and the Missoula Light & Water company will be heard. The ordinance, appropriating money for the city government for the ensuing year, will also be one of the important pieces of business for the city dads and may furnish a topic for discussion. The council will also appoint judges and clerks for the coming spring election. The report of the city attorney regarding the driving of piles on Cedar street will also be heard.




