

### JEFFRIES WILL NOT FIGHT KAUFMANN

EX-CHAMPION SAYS HE WILL RETURN TO RING ONLY TO WHIP BLACK CHAMPION.

New York, March 11.—James J. Jeffries said today that Al Kaufmann, who last night challenged him to fight for the heavyweight championship, had no chance of getting a fight with him, nor had "any other white man."

After declaring that he did not know whether he could get into condition again to meet Jack Johnson, Jeffries said: "If Johnson had been a white man I never would have thought of fighting again."

"How can I tell whether I will fight Johnson?" he asked.

"How do I know whether I can get back into condition? Wait till I get to working for a while, then I may be—but I don't want to talk fight now. But I am feeling fine and taking off weight rapidly."

As to Kaufmann's challenge, Jeffries said: "Kaufmann has not got a chance in the world to fight me. Neither has any other white man. I did not come east to fight and I could not fight here if I wanted to. The laws won't permit it. Kaufmann will have to find someone else. I am not here to fight."

### FUNERAL CONDUCTED BY EAGLES

SERVICES OF REMAINS OF AUGUST BEATTY AT HAMILTON—NEWS OF APPLE TOWN.

Hamilton, March 11.—August Beatty was buried this afternoon in the Hamilton cemetery, his funeral being conducted under the auspices of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, Aerie No. 1633. ### Drifting for Vein.

Hamilton people are interested in the work now being carried on by the Swastika Development company 15 miles south of Hamilton on the D. B. Nicholson ranch. A 12-foot vein of coal has been uncovered and the company is now drifting for the second parallel vein in order to determine the proper location for a shaft. The company is incorporated at \$500,000 and has the following organization: President, Scott Barnes; vice president, J. B. Pruder; secretary-treasurer, E. W. Thayer.

### COMMANDING LEAD HELD BY FRENCHMEN

New York, March 11.—Averaging a fraction over five miles an hour, Clibot and Orphee, the French runners who are leading in the six-day go-as-you-please race at Madison Square garden, are gradually increasing the distance between themselves and their nearest competitors. Late tonight the Frenchmen had almost a 19-mile lead and the trainers picked them as the likely winners of the race, barring accidents.

Oxygen was administered to one of the contestants today with good results. Dineen, whose game struggle has attracted attention, gave signs of weakening, but after getting the oxygen he seemed as sprightly as at the beginning of the race.

Corey and Hegelman did some fast work and displaced Feegan and Curless from fifth place. Pat White, the Irish long distance runner, made an exhibition run of 19 miles in 58:40-5.

### HEARING OF KLEIN DELAYED

TRIAL OF SWISS FAKER STOPS UNTIL WITNESS CAN BE BROUGHT TO TACOMA.

Tacoma, March 11.—The trial of Josua Klein was adjourned early today because Dora Culberson, one of the principal witnesses, is in the state of North Carolina. Klein is the "radio-active" philosopher who is charged with enticing with his strange teachings two Tacoma girls, Miss Sauvegeot and Miss Karasek, to his chalet in Switzerland and holding them prisoners with a number of other women who had become devotees of his cult.

The charge on which he is being tried is assault with intent to kill. He is said to have brandished a knife and to have seized one of the women by the throat when they attempted to leave his chalet.

Stories of a most sensational character are being circulated relative to affairs in Klein's Swiss chalet, where, it is said, 60 women are studying his teachings. The court room was jammed, and in the audience were several prominent society women from Tacoma, Seattle, Portland and other cities, who are said to have given money to Klein for the upbuilding of his faith.

### MME. STEINHEIL WILL FACE ASSIZE COURT

Paris, March 11.—The investigation into the charges against Mme. Steinhell in connection with the murder of her husband, Adolph Steinhell, the painter, and her stepmother, Madame Japy, is about concluded. Interest in the case was revived today by the discovery of important evidence against Mme. Steinhell. Remy Coullaud, a servant in the Steinhell home, who turned against her after she had accused him of being implicated in the crime, testified before Magistrate Andra that the morning after the murder, when feigning complete prostration, Mme. Steinhell jumped out of bed to telephone. The records at the telephone exchange not only confirmed this, but showed that the communication for which she asked was the chateau of her associate, Morris Borderet. The magistrate has refused Mme. Steinhell's application for bail and it is now regarded as certain that she will be placed on trial in the assize court for complicity in the murders.

### WREST THEIR MONEY FROM THE BURGLAR

Butte, March 11.—Henry and Joe Wessler, who, as father and son, own the Wessler Cigar company of Ogden, Utah, had a struggle with a burglar in their room in the Beck block at 3:30 o'clock this morning. The Wesslers had been about the saloons, looking up customers. In one saloon they met A. F. Dingle, whose occupation is unknown. Dingle went home with them, remarking that highwaymen frequent the streets at that hour of the morning. In their room the Wesslers pulled out a pocket full of money. Dingle left, but returned after they had retired. He awakened the son, who, finding the man about to leave with his pocketbook, grappled with him. After a struggle Wessler, assisted by his father, overpowered Dingle, who was locked up by the police. The money was recovered.

### SURRENDERS THE HONOR.

Cleveland, March 11.—Norvel Baptie of North Dakota, world's ice skating champion, surrendered the quarter-mile honor to Morris Wood of New York in the opening series of professional skating races here tonight. He retained, however, the one-mile record.

### NEW SERBIAN NOTE HAS PEACEFUL TONE


Berlin, March 11.—The latest Serbian note in which that country sets forth that she does not desire to provoke war with Austria-Hungary, but maintains that the question of annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina should be regulated by the powers, was delivered at the foreign office here today. Serbia's renunciation of territorial compensation is regarded officially as a peaceful sign. It is not felt, however, that the situation has been cleared up by this communication. The fact remains that Serbia's military preparations are being continued and are causing counter preparations on the part of Austria-Hungary. Turkey is also beginning to show nervousness.

### IS WRITING MESSAGE TO SPECIAL SESSION

Washington, March 11.—President Taft today began work on his message, which is to go to the extra session of congress on Tuesday next, according to the present plans. It is understood the message will deal only with the tariff revision and the general subject of revenue raising. President Taft has indicated that he will ask congress to confine its labors at the extra session exclusively to this subject. The message will not go into details regarding specific schedules. It will be brief and laying the stress on the necessity for prompt action.

### IN MAY.

Seville, Spain, March 11.—The king and queen of Spain, who are passing a few weeks here, will go to Granja after Holy week, to await the birth of the queen's third child. This event is expected in May.

### PRESENT AGREEMENT GOOD ENOUGH

### GOAL OPERATORS REFUSE ALL DEMANDS OF THE UNITED MINERS' UNION.

Philadelphia, March 11.—The anthracite coal operators refused all the demands of the United Miners' union and made a united proposition that the present agreement be continued for three years. The conference adjourned for the afternoon.

Mine officials expected the decision. Thomas Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, declined, however, to comment on the outcome beyond stating that he and the committeemen would discuss it before taking action. The miners and operators will meet again tomorrow.

A statement for the public, agreed on by both sides, says: "The operators declined to accede to the demands. The chief reason offered for the rejection was that any increase in the cost of production would necessitate an advance in the price of coal, and that such an advance was impracticable. The operators said that wages in the anthracite mining industry were already at a high level and could not be increased."

### WILL ISSUE PATENT FOR THE TOWNSITE

Wallace, March 11.—After five years of litigation the highest court of appeal, the secretary of the interior, has decided to issue a patent for the valuable townsite of Kingston, on the border of the Coeur d'Alene forest reserve, to 15 settlers who located on the land in 1884. The land department of Idaho claimed the land under the act granting statehood to Idaho passed by congress in 1890. This act gave sections 16 and 36 of every township to

the state for school land purposes. The settlers refrained from asking for a patent to the land until 1904, when the state contested their application. The litigation was carried to the Coeur d'Alene land office, thence to the commissioner of public lands and finally to the secretary of the interior. The latter holds that the state is entitled to select any other townships as a substitute for the Kingston townsite, but that the townsite proper belongs to the settlers who lived on the land before the land grant of 1890 giving the state land for school purposes.

### PRESIDENT OF BANK MAY ESCAPE TRIAL

Los Angeles, March 11.—W. H. Carlson, president of the defunct Consolidated bank of Los Angeles, who is being prosecuted on several indictments in connection with the failure of that institution, may escape his financial difficulties through a plan broached in court today.

J. F. Sartori, president of the Security Savings bank, appeared before Judge James and said if the court would allow the procedure he would use his influence to have a committee of five bankers appointed to inquire into the actual state of the bank's assets and if such a committee should find it solvent, as claimed by its president, to take over all moneys and securities and pay the depositors 100 cents on the dollar.

### MINISTER INDULGES IN "HIGH FINANCE"

Baltimore, Md., March 11.—The revelations concerning the financial ventures of the Rev. Casper P. Elbert, recently removed from the rectory of St. Catherine's Roman Catholic church of this city, have caused a profound sensation in Catholic circles. The deepest sympathy is expressed for Cardinal Gibbons, who has assumed the burden of paying Father Elbert's debts. These obligations, as far as disclosed, amount to about \$120,000, exclusive of the church debt of \$28,000. They were notes issued to banks and individuals in amounts ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000, and were all signed by Father Elbert as pastor of St. Catherine's church. He had life insurance to the extent of \$70,000, but had borrowed heavily on his policies.

According to an official statement from Cardinal Gibbons very little of the money raised by Father Elbert was used for church purposes.

Father Elbert is now in a sanitarium and is believed to be mentally unbalanced.

### UCKER IS APPOINTED AS CHIEF CLERK

Washington, March 11.—In line with his policy to reorganize the work of the interior department, Secretary Ballinger today made a number of changes in the personnel. These include the appointment of Clement S. Ucker of Ohio, chief of the contest division and administrative officer of the general land office, to be chief clerk of the department in succession to Edward M. Dawson of Maryland, who was appointed assistant attorney of the department.

John W. Holcombe and James I. Parker, both of Indiana, were appointed assistants to the secretary.

### SUBPOENAS ISSUED FOR MANY WITNESSES

Spokane, March 11.—The grand jury called especially to investigate the charges against Judges Root and Gordon has published subpoenas for the following witnesses: L. C. Gilman of St. Paul, assistant to President Hill; Superior Judges E. H. Sullivan and J. Stanley Webster, and Attorneys Cyrus Happy, H. W. Hindman and N. E. Nuzum of Spokane.

The jury is investigating the damage suit of John O. Sharrow vs. the Great Northern, and it is charged Judge Root allowed Gordon, counsel for the railroad, to write the opinion rendered by the state supreme court.

Judge Huneke, having learned that the grand jury had hired a stenographer to keep a record of its proceedings, has ordered the shorthand man excluded and his notes destroyed.

### MAN BURNS TO DEATH.

Charlotte, N. C., March 11.—In a fire which destroyed Biggs' sanitarium at Greensboro tonight, Frank Greene of Goldston was burned to death and a number of others were seriously injured. Four women jumped from second-story windows and escaped with slight injuries.
